Pitroad, 700th: for all you ship modelers, two new kits. US Navy CVL-24 "Belleau Wood" light aircraft carrier, and a modern "Kidd" Class destroyer. Whilst on ship models, a new firm Derrickpost, produces a 700th scale kit in resin and metal of the Heavy Cruiser "USS San Francisco".

REVIEW: Eagles Talon 1/48th Mitsubishi Navy Type 96 (A5M4) "Claude" (by Jim Schubert)

This is a very good vacuum formed kit at a fraction of the cost of the Fine Molds kit of the precedent A5Ml. The only parts I plan to replace are the engine and propeller. The surface detailing comprises sharp, slightly incuse, panel lines, etc.

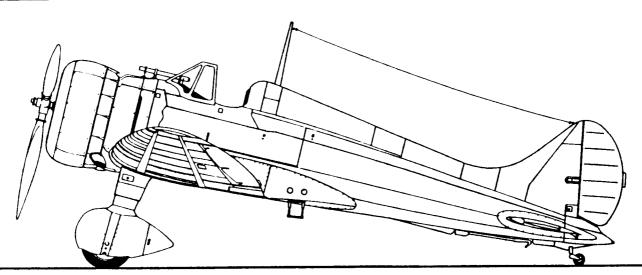
My parts box just happens to contain a Mania (Hasegawa) Nate engine, which with a Tamiya Zeke 21's crankcase nose, is the correct size and looks just right. The spinnerless three bladed prop, which has finely tapered blades, will be tough to convert from some other suitable donor prop — if I can find one. I plan to use a complete Tamiya Zeke 21 cockpit to detail the Claude. The tail wheel will also have to be found in the spares box as none is provided in the kit.

Eagles Talon provide a good history, a great 1/48th four view drawing and adequate instructions. They also provide a useable vac-formed windscreen. Unusual for a vac-form kit, they also provide decals — minus Hinomarus — for two natural metal machines with black engine cowls and red tails.

The A5Ml was the first production model of the "Claude"; the A5M4 was the last and most numerous. The A5M4 is also the best documented with dozens of pu#blished color schemes and a great Maru Mechanic devoted to it. The best overall reference for the A5M series is Air Enthusiast Quarterly No. 19.

If 1/72nd is your scale you're in luck too because over 30 years ago Nichimo produced an excellent A5M4, which they still issue. Apart from its incredibly poor engine and virtually no cockpit detail the kit is outstanding - better than many current issues in 72nd. Mine, in the markings of Saburo Sakai's Hainan Air Force machine, took second in class in the IPMS/USA 1972 National.

The SU-7 series of fighter-bomber aircraft from Sukhoi OKB is a classic example of incremental development in aircraft design. First introduced in the 1950's, the SU-7, NATO code-named "Fitter", underwent numerous changes over its long production life, from the SU-7 to the swing-wing SU-17, then SU-20, and finally the SU-22, two of which were victimized by a pair of Navy Tomcats over the Gulf of Sidra back in 1981. The role of the aircraft remained essentially the same, and its NATO code name was unchanged, except for the mod suffix, in spite of changes in its design. Though perhaps lacking the recognition and fame of the more widely known MiG fighters, the SU-7 and its variants are nonetheless among the most successful Soviet warplanes ever built.

The OEZ kit is the only 1:48 scale kit on the market as far as I know, (except ESCI's, which is the same kit in a different box) and while the fit is not very good, the kit does let you build an accurate model of either the BKL or the BMK variant. The molding is generally on a par with ESCI, and the plastic is soft, but it's clean and free of flash or sink marks, and the mold lines are very fine and easy to remove.

The cockpit is well detailed, offering side panels with lots of molded in gizmos and a not-half-bad instrument panel with recessed dial faces. The seat, however, is terrible. It's the sort of thing 1'd expect from ESCI, or worse. It's very crude, with no cushion or harness, and no detail to the frame at all. You'll need to cobble something up to replace it. Later BKL's and all BMK's had the KM-1 ejection seat as used in the MiG-21, for which some limited references are available to help you scratchbuild something that looks right.

The canopy comes in two flavors, a single piece to build the kit with the canopy shut and a two-piece canopy for building in the open position. Note that this also gives you a spare, so if you screw one up you can still use the other. The canopy is clear enough, but quite thick, and opens by sliding to the rear like the F-86. It fits okay, though you may need a little careful sanding to get it to fit perfectly. It's more brittle than the stuff the rest of the kit is molded in, so be careful to avoid cracking it.

The instructions tell you to put weight in the nose, but they don't say how much. Because of the sweep of the wings and the massive fuselage and tail, there's a lot of plastic aft of the main gear struts, and it takes a good deal of weight up front to counterbalance it. The instructions tell you to put the weight inside the shock cone, but there isn't enough room for the amount you'll need, so you'll have to put more in behind the nose cone assembly, or just behind the cockpit bulkhead. The shock cone assembly consists of about five parts, and fits inside the fuselage halves. The trick is keeping it straight while the glue dries so the tip of the cone doesn't "wander" off center. There is a separate piece for the nose, giving the finished model a nice, thin intake wall, and this goes on the front of the assembled fuselage. Some filling and sanding may be needed to match these parts up smoothly.

The fit of the fuselage halves is reasonably good, needing just a bit of putty to touch up the seams. Surface detail is good, with engraved panel lines. Sadly, there are rather large gaps where the wing roots meet the fuselage, and shims and putty are needed to fill these. The same is true of the vertical and horizontal stabilizers - neither mates well to the rear fuselage, and some work is needed to fill the gaps. The wing halves go together without much fuss, though they need a bit of filler at the tips due to a slight mismatch. If you're building a BMK version, you'll have to remove some contours in the lower fuselage sides where the main gear doors go.

On the positive side, the kit gives you separate ailerons and rudder, so you can position them as you wish. There are separate parts for the 4 airbrakes in the rear fuselage, and two little bleed air vents that go in the sides of the body. You get clear parts for the landing and running lights, as well as two "Odd Rods" IFF antennas, and there are a whole batch of little air scoops, as well as the fuel line/control cable fairings that were used on all but the early model Fitter-A's. These scoops and fairings could easily have been molded in, and why they weren't escapes me, unless OEZ decided that more parts automatically means a better kit... The air data probe for the nose needs some work - the base is square, and needs to be cut at an angle to line up properly and point straight ahead like it's supposed to. Anyway, all these goodies result in a reasonably detailed exterior, which greatly enhances the appearance of the finished kit.

You get landing gear options for either the BMK or BKL, the latter being equipped with skids that were designed to be extended when landing on unimproved runways or icy fields to shorten the stopping distance. The parts are adequately detailed, and fit okay, though the instructions are a bit ambiguous regarding assembly of the main gear struts. You also get both the standard nose wheel and door and the bulged nose gear door designed to accommodate the larger, low-pressure nose tire used on the BKL. There are two sets of main gear doors - one set of flat ones for the BMK, the other with bulges to accommodate the larger tires on the BKL. All the doors come in one piece, and need to be cut along pre-grooved lines into 3 parts for the BKL, or 2 pieces for the BMK. These pieces are tricky to attach to the main gear assembly, since there are no real mounting points and you have to eyeball the positioning.

The kit provides several underwing stores options - fuel tanks, rocket pods, air-to-ground rockets and bombs. The UB-16 rocket pods are the best in terms of accuracy and detail, but you only get two of them. The instructions tell you to mount both inboard and outer wing pylons, but production BKL variants had only the inner pylon on each wing. The outer pylons did not become standard until the later BMK model (though most BKL's were later retrofitted with them). The Fitter was a thirsty brute, and only carried some 650 gallons of fuel internally, so most SU-7's carried extra fuel tanks mounted under the belly or on the inboard wing pylons.

The decals are all on one large sheet of decal film, rather than the individual type found in most kits. This is no problem, since you gotta cut the things out anyway - may as well trim right at the edges. They are thin enough, and the registration is good, though the colors seem overly bright. You get markings for Czechoslovakian, Algerian, and Indian air forces, as well as the now-defunct USSR. There are others available from Superscale that will let you mark the plane for Syrian, Egyptian or Finnish users, to name but a few. Most Fitter-A's in Russian service were left in bare metal finish, while many non-Soviet planes were painted in various camouflage schemes. Starting in the early 70's, most Eastern-bloc Fitters were repainted in camo as well. Just do a little homework to be sure the colors you use were used by the nationality you're marking the kit for.

In summary, while this offering from OEZ certainly has its shortcomings, it is also surprisingly good in many respects. If you're willing to replace the seat and put in a little work on the spots where the Fitter doesn't fit, it can be made into a very nice rendition of an aircraft that, in some form or other, has seen service for over thirty years, and in its later versions is still flying with a variety of forces around the world. With the kit now available under the ESCI label at about \$13 mail order, the price is lower than I paid for the original from OEZ, and shouldn't be too painful for the only 1:48 scale SU-7 kit on the market.
