The Rye Field Panther G, part 1: From the Ground Up by Rick Knapp


The 1/35 scale Rye Field kit of the Panther G, Early/Late Versions with Full Interior, Kit no. RM-5016, is an intimidating project to contemplate. Packed into a huge box and featuring 1,907 parts with clear upper hull and turret, it includes every conceivable detail that made up this iconic German tank of World War II. As daunting as all that appears (The instruction manual runs to 52 pages.), having acquired the thing at a bargain price, I knew I'd have to dive in and give it a go. For good or ill, this will be Installment One in the Panther G saga.



The instructions would have a builder begin with the Panther's turret, but I chose the conventional route and started, literally, from the ground up. Discovering that the kit's individual-link tracks can be made workable, I began putting together the first run of 87 links. The track links are molded in reddish brown styrene, well detailed, with minimal flash. Unlike the track links for Rye Field's Gruppe Fehrmann Tiger I tank, which feature the track guide teeth as separate parts, the Panther G's track links are one-piece affairs, guide teeth included. Parts X4, which appear to be optional ice cleats, are a bit of a mystery, since only seven are included for each run of track. Are they meant to be added only at the most visible front and rear portions of the tracks?

One review of this model mentions a handy jig that allows construction of runs of six links at a time. Actually, the kit contains a pair of track jigs that can be joined to allow building sections of eleven links each. The track pins are spaced for easy insertion, five at once, when left on their sprues. With careful gluing, the end result is a run of track that can be manipulated like the real thing. Care, and some cleanup afterward, are needed when cutting the sprues away from the glued-in links. There are two types of track pins, labeled inner and outer. This means that a left-hand and a right-hand track will be made. In truth, it's hard to tell a great deal of difference in the tiny link heads, but the fact that there is a differentiation speaks to the level of detail the kit makers have strived for.

I've completed one run of track (87 links), mostly with little trouble, and have taken a break to work on the tank's lower hull and suspension; I'll talk about those aspects of the kit, including fun with photo-etched parts, in the next installment of this tale.

Out of Box Review: Moebius EVA Pod by Brent Bristow



Moebius has been releasing several models of vehicles from the film 2001: A Space Odyssey, and their newest release, the EVA Pod, is a massive kit with tons of detail. This 1/8 scale model will build up to 10 ¼" by 11 ½" and features a fully detailed interior and a hatch door that opens.

After initially looking at the kit, the parts appear to be molded cleanly, and the details are crisp. Some of these details will be a challenge to mask and paint, but fortunately, most of this kit can be painted in sub-assemblies. The instructions are in a 12-page, fully illustrated book that is easy to follow. The parts are made of white and clear styrene, with chrome plating for the exterior lights.



After test fitting some of the parts, I found that they are well engineered and fit together easily. However, making the seams invisible will require a lot of work. There is also some minor warping in the some of the larger parts but cementing the parts together should take care of these issues.



The interior is designed with clear parts for the computer screens and light panels. There should be plenty of room to run LEDs for both the interior panels and the exterior lights. A lighting kit will be available, or you can wire you own.

Perhaps the biggest challenge for this piece will be to get a flawless white finish on such a large, smooth area. Properly painting this model will require an approach similar to painting a car model, with extensive wet sanding.

While this model costs \$189, it looks as though Moebius has done their homework on this one and has produced a closely screen accurate kit. It will require a good bit of work, but should build up quite nicely, and will be a must have kit for sci-fi modelers!
