Minutes of the 20 March 2018 General Meeting

Vice President Bill Wagner—presiding for Chris Merseal—called the meeting to order at 7:42 pm. There were 23 people, including two guests, in attendance.

Rick Keasey showed the four models he entered in the IPMS/Roscoe Turner show in Indianapolis earlier that month. His models took three Firsts and a Second. Keasey recapped the Roscoe Turner show. Also in Show & Tell, Bill Wagner showed his Bandai 1:144 scale Star Wars AT-AT in progress.

Bob Delaney talked about the KC CON show in Kansas City earlier that month. Wagner presented Scott Van Aken with his 2017 Modeler of the Year “keeper” trophy. Marion Morris asked if anyone was interested in going with him to Branson, Mo. For the Regional in May. He was considering renting a van for that trip. Van Aken brought in two foam containers for transporting models, which he was offering to anyone who was interested.

After a break, Gary Chambers presented his images taken last summer at the MAKS Air Show near Moscow, along with pictures from a naval museum and a technical museum, both in the Moscow area.

The Model of the Month “Beauty Contest” drew 12 entries, and was won by John Mueller’s Rumpler C. IV. He selected the \$5 Schaefer’s Hobby Shop gift certificate as his prize. The raffle winners were: Vince Murphy (AMT 1:25 scale 1969 Oldsmobile 442) and Dennis Bowman (\$5 CRM Hobbies gift certificate).

Meeting was adjourned at 8:52 pm.

Minutes of the 27 March 2018 Business Meeting

Jim Victor hosted the business meeting at EdgeWild Bistro & Tap in Creve Coeur, Mo. Seven members were in attendance. President Chris Merseal called this to order at 7:06 pm.

The April and May General Meetings were planned. The meeting on 17 April will feature Rick Keasey’s demo on figure face painting. Members may bring in figures they are working on to show off and get advice. There will be a Model of the Month “Beauty Contest;” Bob Delaney will begin photographing and interviewing members for

the Spotlight of the Month; and, Chris Merseal will show off new items from CRM Hobbies. We’ll also be recording member participation in club activities for the special year-end raffle.

The 15 May General Meeting will feature the second Modeler of the Year Contest, with the Special Category of Crazy Eights (anything with 8 in the name). It will also be a build night.

In new business: Keasey asked if we could contact the Region 5 Coordinator for info on average attendance at meetings (Merseal said we’re averaging 20-30 per meeting). Marion Morris will look into it. Board members discussed ways to increase participating at meetings, including having all who bring in models do a short Show & Tell. Keasey also suggested we have a written agenda for our meetings.

The E-Board discussed increasing the membership rate for those members (10 at present) who want their newsletter via US Mail (vs. email). (See Keasey’s article on page 3 of this issue). The E-Board agreed to increase the \$15 membership rate by \$15 for those who want a printed newsletter, effective with the June 2018 membership renewals.

Merseal said he’d discuss additional duties for E-Board members and appointees at the next general meeting. He also said he’d contact Webmaster Doug Barton regarding our website, and suggest it be redirected to our Google Plus page. Keasey said he could put every member’s picture and biography on that Google Plus page.

Bob Delaney showed a draft of the press release announcing our Invitational in September, for distribution to local media. He also showed the E-Board the deadlines for placing an ad for that show in the *IPMS/USA Journal*.

E-Board members talked about how to get members to quiet down during presentations, to possibly offer snacks to contest judges, and about the need for more demos at our meetings. Merseal suggested polling members about the demos they’d like to see.

Merseal also said he’d explore possible contact with the Mark Twain Model Club, which meets at Mark Twain Hobby Center in St. Charles. Keasey will look into our holding an Adult Building Course in Edwardsville this

The next Business Meeting is tentatively scheduled for 22 May at 7:30 pm, with host to be determined.

Merseal adjourned the meeting at 8:30 pm.

A note from the Treasurer, Rick Keasey:

For those of you who don't know, I was elected Chapter Treasurer this past December. Since then, I have been balancing the Club's books and discovered something interesting:

The cost of mailing newsletters was ~\$24 per person, leaving the Club with a ~\$9.00 deficit per person receiving the newsletter by mail. The math worked out like this.

~10 pages X \$0.15 per page = \$1.50.

\$1.50 for pages + \$.50 per stamp = \$2.00 per newsletter.

\$2.00 per newsletter X 12 newsletters per year = \$24 per year.

\$24 per person X 10 persons - \$240.00

Everyone knows that over time inflation insidiously creeps into everything, including our Club's financials. The fact of the matter is, annual dues now go toward paying for the church, door prizes, printing various forms, the PO Box, club picnic, etc. Spending an additional \$24 per member for 10 members is deficit spending and is fiscally irresponsible. Therefore, the E-Board has unanimously decided to charge members wishing to receive a mailed newsletter an additional \$15 per year, making their total dues \$30 per year. This will be effective starting 01 July 2018. To be clear, for the additional \$15, you will receive a condensed, 5-page monthly newsletter via the U.S. Postal Service. The newsletter editor will do his best to include all pertinent Club information within the allotted 5 pages, but it cannot be guaranteed.

The Tale of Two Kits

(Part 1)

I just want to say: "What a time to be a modeler!"

With that in mind, with the abundance of models subjects and scales, it's more than enough to build your favorite subject for a lifetime. My model subject that I feel that I could build the rest of life is the Messerschmitt series of 109s, over 33,000 109s were built. And the modeling manufacturers have covered this subject in various scales through the decades. I've been modeling 109s since 1964. WOW, I'm old. The following review/build is my opinion and my opinion only. As you know, I'm not an expert at anything, especially the 'nuts and bolts' of the 109s, but I enjoy modeling this aircraft and this is a great opportunity to build two 'up to date' models from two different model manufacturers.

I wanted to compare and contrast the new **1/48 Bf-109G-6 (late series) by Eduard, ProfiPack #82111** (2016) MSRP: \$50; and the new **1/48 Bf-109G-6 by Tamiya, Kit 61117** (2018) MSRP: \$53.

I'm not going to go through the history of the 109s—there are hundreds of books, articles, etc. on the aircraft—but I only want to say that 99999 G-6s were built and soldiered on in WWII in all the different European theaters. There are many reviews/builds on the Internet to help you out, also.

First, let's look at the instructions:

Both kits come with incredible box art. WOW, I could look at the box tops all day long.

The Eduard instruction sheet is 16 pages long on regular 8 ½ by 11 1/2 inch sheets. It includes a brief history of all versions of the 109s. The instruction sheet includes the diagram of the sprues (great). The color callouts are for the Gunze Sangyo and Mr. Color Paints. The pages of the instruction pages have plenty of room for the illustrations, so you can make/add notes. I find this very handy, especially writing the color of the paints used for parts. Instead of the Mr. Color paint number, I can write the actual paint name used for that


part, e.g. for Mr. Color XXX, use RLM 66 on the pages. The instruction sheet comes with five color pages for the markings for five aircraft (great) and another page for all the other detail markings common to all 109Gs. When using the instruction sheets, I found that the extra space was greatly appreciated; the sequences were easy to recognize and very easy to follow.


The Tamiya instruction sheet is 16 pages on a smaller sized pages, 7 by 11 inch sheets with a separate sheet (16 ½ by 11 ½ inches) for painting and marking layouts for three aircraft and a multi-language sheet with the background history of the 109 G-6 with diagrams. The color callouts use the Tamiya paint range (naturally). The instruction sheets are full of diagrams and instructions. They had a logical sequence of instructions, but at times it was difficult to read and follow, because of the smaller page format, compared to the Eduard instructions.

I studied both instruction sheets, and I wanted to comment on their overall impression to me, because it shows how the different manufacturers show their philosophy/vision on how the kit is to be built. The Eduard kit does have a simpler instruction sheet, because they have fewer parts to complete the kit and have larger pages which make it easier to follow the kit construction sequence. The Tamiya kit has more parts and more options, e.g. complete engine shown or not. Even though their pages are smaller, they put more diagrams and instructions on their page, which caused me to have more difficulty reading and following the sequence of construction.
