





# Hague's Corner

*Editor's note: Dick shares a unique running text and visual diary of his modeling adventures which includes triumphs, defeats, lessons learned and tips. It is too tall of an order to pull together one complete build from the various messages, so what you are seeing in these articles is a moving "window" of Dick's modeling adventures over time. Nevertheless, we are getting a host of tips and lessons learned suitable for beginners and experienced modelers alike. Even though you do not see a build from start to finish, I hope you find Dick's running modeling diary as informative as I do.*

Figure 1 illustrates how real sunshine is the only way to get a color match. Here a match to a bottle of paint is sought using previously painted white card stock pieces. Although not shown here a match to the bottle was later found and used successfully.

Figure 2 shows some current projects underway. The green plane is a Czech Avia B.35 I started in 1976 on an IBM school trip to Chicago. I recently restarted it. The tan colored plane nearby is the improved Avis B.135 I started a couple of months ago. Also seen are the fuselages of two Mitsubishi A7M fighters and an F-86D Sabre. One of two Me-209's are at the top left of the photo. One is stalled until I can locate the missing main wheel well top. The tiny cockpit of the Yak-1000 is still attached to the paint stick with blue tape. The tape held the cockpit while I sprayed onto it to seal the cockpit decals on. Inexpensive blue painters tape has the best 'stick' to temporarily hold just about anything you are working on. However don't use it to mask on top of paint unless you want to take a chance on pulling paint off along with the tape.




Figure 3 (next page) shows one of the A7M cockpit modules after it has been sprayed Mitsubishi cockpit green. Figure 4 shows why pre-painted photo etch is appreciated as here the A7M cockpit modules are having details done with decals. Prismacolor pencil treatments are still to come.

Tip alert & product endorsement. Figure 5 shows a model that has had a product called Perfect Plastic Putty spread with a spatula to fill a gap between the wings and the fuselage of the Fw-189B. With most putty for models you let it dry and then sand it off and possibly any molded on detail that is in the area of the putty. The excess putty has been removed in



Figure 6 with nothing more than a wet finger almost immediately after applying it. Maybe a tiny bit more got removed but was easily fixed with the same finger!

Figure 7 (next page) shows that sticky blue tape being used to hold a small seat while I add belts and harnesses. Later the seat will be stuck to a paint stick with blue tape and sprayed with some flat clear to remove gloss from the glue and to help hold the belts on.



The Italeri OH-58 helicopter in Figure 8 is awaiting research to supplement the somewhat lacking painting guide in the kit instructions. Mostly for the four bladed main rotor 'real' colors!

Figures 9 and 10 are the Super Model Piaggio P.108. Two other four engine types I never seem to finish are the B-45 and the Russian Pe-8. Finally, while in Chesterfield I restarted another current four engine type, the great Revell C-45 kit (Figure 11).





# The Saga of Hobby Shop treasures in Belgium

Over the past 10 years I have travelled to Belgium several times, primarily to see the WW1 and WW2 historic sites around Bastogne and Ypres. As I drive around the country I'm always on the lookout for hobby shops. This latest trip was a bit different in that I searched online for shops near both cities. One would think you would find great shops in Brussels (Belgium's largest city) but except for a large model railway shop there are no scale model shops. When I arrived in Bastogne, the go to place for the Battle of the Bulge historic sites, it turned out there was a shop right around the corner from our hotel off the town center. I have driven past it several times over the years but never noticed it as it only vaguely mentioned scale model kits. The shop, *Kit ou Double* (in English "Kit or Double"), is small but packed to the roof with kits, paints etc.

Of course I know the argument that you can get anything you want online so why bother with a brick and mortar shop. This is certainly true and I've done a fair number of online orders myself but you need to know that the item exists, which is why I still am always seeking out shops in hopes of snagging something unique. In this case it was a 1/72 German midget sub from IBG.

Next stop was Ypres, or "Ieper" as the Belgians call it. Three of the major battles of WW1 occurred here, first and second Ypres and third Ypres, also known as Passchendaele. By the way, Ypres is the go to place for mussels, beer, waffles and chocolate. Not a bad reason to visit in any case. At first it didn't look like there were any local shops which is not surprising as the area is pretty rural. I did see a listing for a place called Domino, which appeared to sell pipes, tobacco, brandy and a few kits. It was only about 10 minutes away in a village called Heuvelland so I decided to give it a visit. When I first walked in it looked disappointing unless you wanted some very pricey wine, brandy or cigars. Then I wandered downstairs and just about fainted. The nearest analogy I could make would be shopping in the Hannants warehouse in the UK if it was open to the public. The accompanying photos show it better than I can describe it but suffice to say there were at least 20 aisles loaded floor to ceiling with kits, most with multiple copies. There were separate areas for aircraft, armor, ships, tools, paints etc., all very neatly organized and well lit. Turns out the shop is a major online site little known outside Europe. I even found an employee named Sylvain who spoke excellent English who was eager to talk models and help. They had brands like Great Wall and Platz in stock that we know about but find difficult to source even online. Since I model only in 1/72 scale I got the brand new Airfix Me-262 B and two T-Model armor kits. I would have bought more if I had more suitcase space. Sylvain was kind enough to allow me to take the photos for this article. You can order online at [www.dominomodel.be](http://www.dominomodel.be). Give them a try. I think you will really be surprised at what you find. If you ever visit this area of Belgium the shop is definitely worth a visit.

On this trip I also had the opportunity to photograph the actual "mole" from the film "Dunkirk." Not easy to find by the way, but that's a story for another day. Ask me about it at a club meeting if you're interested.

# Maker Faire 2019

On June 2, the IPMS Northern Virginia Modelers participated in Maker Faire 2019 at George Mason University in Fairfax. The NOVA Labs of Reston Virginia was the primary sponsor of the event. Maker Faires are gatherings of people who enjoy learning and love sharing what they can do. The phenomenon began in the Bay Area on the West Coast in 2006. Subjects represented included baking, costume design, robotics (C-3PO and several Star Wars characters were roaming around – think Air and Scare), drones, print making, juggling, 3-D printing, textile arts, blacksmithing, computer simulations (e.g. the Battle of Britain) and of course scale modeling. Overall attendance to the event was between 4,500 and 5,500 people so we received quite a bit of exposure.

The club was ably represented by your author, Tom Henderson, and Curt and Shirley Clinton. Tom and I answered questions about the models on display. The models illustrated samples of different categories and scales on the tables. In a departure from the Udvar-Hazy events this one was not dedicated to aircraft so we had armor, figures and cars on display. Curt and Shirley ran a Make & Take for the youngsters which proved so popular we ran out of kits well before the end of the show (something we'll correct next year). Curtis also worked on a model vehicle kit during the event.

## Maker Fair (continued)

The accompanying pictures show our location at the Faire (the GMU Johnson Center Atrium). They illustrate how crowded the place was and how busy we were. There was a great deal of interest in our display and the hobby in general. Visitor questions focused on historical events and on modeling techniques. Most of the questions focused on the latter such as the building and painting techniques used. Additionally, we were asked more than once about the level of 3-D printing in the hobby. Those questions were probably inspired due to the presence of a 3-D printer at the Faire.

Interesting people we met include my conversation with one of our Model Classic Junior 1st place winners. Tom met a lady and her young daughter whose grandfather/great-grandfather was one of the few US pilots that got airborne during Pearl Harbor and shot down a Japanese aircraft. Another great visit was by the son of WWII 13 victory ace Glennon Moran who flew with the 352nd Fighter Group. Those were only a few of several encounters we experienced with the "Greatest Generation" at the event. It was a rewarding day.


