Tim also reminded everyone about the Northern Virginia Maker Faire which will take place 2 June at George Mason University from 11:00am to 5:00pm. Our plan is to have all types of models displayed and hopefully people building some kits as well. Location is the JC Atrium at George Mason University in Fairfax. At present we have a sufficient number of volunteers. However we have eight free passes for people to visit the show. The Maker Faire is an excellent opportunity to show our hobby off to the public. Our Theme for the 2019 IPMS National Convention is the intersection of several things.

First - We could tell you that “As serious **accuracy obsessed modelers** we are appalled at the lack of historical education in today's youth.....” And if time permitted I could tell you stories such as the one about the clerk at Staples who was printing a batch of our flyers and scratched his head and said “I thought it was the Japanese...” Note - Our guys are just as fanatical about accuracy as any other modelers and we have the utmost respect for our Pearl Harbor veterans.

Second – There are a lot of modelers who no longer have fun with their hobby. They suffer from Advance Modelers Syndrome. The theme is a way of putting a level of fun back into the convention.

Third – Like the Delta's our club is just a bit unconventional. We're trying to spark interest by tipping our hat at being slightly unconventional and doing things just a bit different from the normal IPMS National Convention. Some of those things are the economical dessert reception instead of a full blown banquet on the closing night. By doing that we're working to be more inclusive of all who come to the convention. We're also encouraging display only models and specially asking for previous award winners to bring their models back for viewing by all. So far the unconventional aspect of the show seems to be paying off! The numbers are looking like we'll have a very special convention! We have a record number of vendor tables reserved!

There are hundreds of categories for the contest portion of the convention as per the norm. The bulk of the contest portion of the convention will be identical to the typical IPMS Nationals. We also have a few theme and special awards (D-Day, Wrecker's Ball, Make-A-Wish, etc.) that are intended to cater to the historical accuracy and craftsmanship aspects of the contest in selected special theme veins. But yes we also have one theme award of “Was it Over When the Germans Bombed Pearl Harbor” award. Open to interpretation? You bet it is!!! That's the point of that one! Hypothetical – Humorous – Something that is just “Wrong.” All we ask is that the person entering for that theme award explain the connection.

Hague's Corner

Manassas Air Show, 4 May 2019

Editor's note: Dick shares a unique running text and visual diary of his modeling adventures which includes triumphs, defeats, lessons learned and tips. It is too tall of an order to pull together one complete build from the various messages, so what you are seeing in these articles is a moving "window" of Dick's modeling adventures over time. Nevertheless, we are getting a host of tips and lessons learned suitable for beginners and experienced modelers alike. Even though you do not see a build from start to finish, I hope you find Dick's running modeling diary as informative as I do. One of the messages Dick recently sent to his readers a short summary of the Manassas Air show on 4 May so this is a 1 to 1 scale airshow report. Dick volunteered to work the airshow where he talked to visitors about a B-25 nose section on display.

I don't know what was hotter, the exhausts of the two dueling Czech L-39's or my feet, but I'm sure both would show up on an infrared scan! I saw less of the air performers and static displays than I did the day of the rehearsal as I spent most of the day on the back of or beside the B-25 nose shown in the first two pictures. Those two pictures were actually taken last year as I couldn't get a clear shot when I was in picture taking mode.

We definitely need to teach history in a more interesting way in our schools. I found that people of all ages responded with interest as I talked about the B-25 and its deeds. About half of the people remembered the recent news that Dick Cole, the last Doolittle crew member had passed away. One of the large pictures at the display depicted the B-25s on the Hornet's flight deck with a lone B-25 taking off. What really impressed the visitors was when pointed to the right side and tell them that Dick Cole was sitting in the copilot's seat of that B-25!

I also had another surprise for the people who saw the movie Forever Young. When I told them this was the very same B-25 cockpit they watched Mel Gibson crash in at the start of the movie they were almost as excited as if they were meeting Mel himself! This came at the end of my presentation explaining the tortured career of this particular aircraft and its survival. Learning the history of this B-25 really nailed it as it connected them personally with the B-25 in a way they won't forget!

Additionally, once I had a captive audience I had to tell of my own experience building a model B-25, to include painting that devil's yellow color on the prop tips before finding out the Doolittle Raiders prop tips were not yellow. After all the trouble painting those tips I wasn't about to repaint them and sought another paint scheme to complete the model.

I then pointed out all the yellow painted prop tips on the C-54 and TBM around us and was somewhat surprised at how few knew why that was done. That pointed out the very good reason people should get safety briefings before entering an active flight line which of course this was not. The reason for the unpainted B-25 tips was another opportunity to give a short history lesson which I think the younger folks really liked.

While I did not get to roam around Saturday I did manage to get a shot of the rear inside of the TBM and of how the gun turret looks from underneath. There were many other aircraft on static display that I didn't record with my little camera but I did get that great shot of the Marine standing on top of the C-53 rotor head taking pictures of the show.

I can't wait to do this again in 2020!



Maryland Automotive Modelers Association NNL

The Maryland Automotive Modelers Association (MAMA) – Mid-Atlantic Nameless National Luminaries (NNL) show and contest was held on Saturday 11 May 2019 in Severna Park, Maryland. Nora and I arrived to find that Northern Virginia Modelers was well represented at the show. Several NoVA members made the short and scenic trip to Severna Park for this fine event. If you have never attended an NNL event, it's a little different than your typical IPMS show in that it features only scale model cars and trucks and has a unique judging paradigm, more on that later.

Although it's distinct, it's also fun to step outside of the usual IPMS trappings. And the workmanship takes a back seat to no one. The tables were packed with beautifully crafted kits. Some of the kits brought me back to my days as a young boy drooling over a Shelby Cobra or a 1930 Packard.

The NNL story is interesting in itself, one automotive modeling blog reports it this way:

The birth of the NNL was a backhanded slap at Mark Gustavson and his attempts to create a national model car contest known as the FIMCC - the First Invitational Model Car Championship, scheduled to be held in Omaha, Nebraska April 11-13, 1980. Mark readily admits that his lack of experience and youthful arrogance resulted in the cancellation of the contest, but he lashed out at the "big name" modelers from the old MPC contests for a perceived lack of support for his efforts to launch a premier juried model car contest.

The FIMCC was stillborn and never got off the ground. Fueled by his embarrassment and in spite of his own (admitted) lack of judgement, Mark used his Putty Thrower column in the fledgling modeling magazine Scale Auto Enthusiast to lash out at "those national luminaries who shall remain nameless" for not supporting his proposed national contest.

Many modelers thought Mark's comments to be rather pompous, so three guys in Toledo, Ohio - led by old MPC legend Tom Woodruff - held a casual get-together in the garage of Tom's home in the summer of 1980 just to hang out and look at models, without judges or a competitive atmosphere. They called it the Nameless National Luminaries or NNL. The idea was to hold a show that was the antithesis of what many perceived as GSL's "best of the best", tightly juried, anal-retentive judging. The Toledo boys had a non-competitive model show with no judging, just a popular vote for Best in Show.

The Toledo show grew in popularity, particularly for modelers who were intimidated by the nerve-wracking world of top shelf competitive modeling, and over the last twenty-five years the format has gradually spread to other locales. Today both contest formats have grown and established its own niche in the automotive modeling culture. The Toledo NNL is still the Granddaddy, but the big east coast NNL in New Jersey is the largest model contest in the country (in terms of number of entries), and Birmingham and the West Coast shows also draw well, showcasing extraordinary work from modelers who might not enter a juried competition.

The Great Salt Lake International Model Car Championship is without question the pinnacle of scale automotive modeling in the competitive arena, and regularly draws the cream of the crop in modeling talent and miniature automotive works of art.

To this day, NNL does not use dedicated judges and the people attending the show vote for the best entry in each category and for the best in show.

The vendors were varied ranging from guys thinning their stashes to handmade resin and metal accessories to dress up an engine. Prices were good with many deals to be had. I went home with a Moebius Models 1952 Hudson Hornet that I picked up for \$25 and a bunch of ignition wires, battery cables and pre-wired distributors. If you are looking for something different, a little off beat, and definitely a lot of fun, I can highly recommend an NNL show.


