

The Giant Kite




WARD'S WORKSHOP

As I drove by Elmhurst's Eldridge Park Soccer Field one breezy fall day, I was startled by an evil-looking, noisy giant black delta kite rising up from behind the park trees; a man holding a large wooden spool of heavy cord was struggling to hang onto this scary-looking thing. I knew right away that I needed one of these! I parked my car, walked over and talked with the man flying the kite. As it turned out, he was the designer and builder of this "Black Overcast." After he finally brought down the kite and it lay safely on the ground, he went to his station wagon, rummaged around in the rear and brought back a set of his printed construction plans. Five dollars later, I was happily on my way back to my workshop!



The **Giant Delta Kite** is made out of a 15-foot by 25-foot sheet of 6mil black polyethylene Visqueen plastic film (commonly used in home construction); a full roll of "real" duct tape; 8 pieces of 8-foot bamboo, 3/4-inch diameter; to use these by plugging two of each into 1-inch diameter, various lengths of aluminum tubing (cut from an old folding lawn chair) forming four long spars; plus a handful of 5/16 brass grommets. Easy enough to build one in an afternoon as long as you have a *large* flat work space.

Why? Because this kite measures 30 feet in wingspan and 15 feet in length! I used my driveway. You also need about 500 feet of 400-plus-lb. test 1/8 braided nylon cord (Paracord? \$\$\$). I found some inexpensive drapery cord that met all the requirements. A wood disc spool with a piece of broom handle will complete the reel. A strong adult with leather gloves is needed to hold the reel, plus two teenagers to hold the kite up off the ground in a nose-high attitude into a 15 to 20 mph max breeze. No, you do not run with this kite!



The kite rises very easily but is difficult to bring down, with its wing area of 225 square feet (Piper Cub: 184 square feet; Me 163 rocket fighter: 199 square feet). To get it down, the "reel man" stands still while someone else wearing gloves "walks" the line down at shoulder height to get under the kite and cause it to stall, bringing it down gently. That allows the reel man to wind the cord back onto the reel. The kite comes apart in about 10 minutes: The spars slip out of edge pockets and unplug from the tubing joiners, forming a 15-lb. flat package with a length of 8 feet.

Use with caution--this kite is not constructed to carry a person or a live animal! At present, this kite is at my son Mike's house in Lake City, Minn., and is used regularly by his Boy Scout troop. (People in the photos here are: Reel Man Paul Knowing; Confused Men assembling the kite--me and my son Patrick)



This was the second year for this event at the Illinois Valley Regional Airport in Peru. The weather held the TBMs to seven instead of the 14 that were to attend. Other aircraft were: Canadair Mk.6 (F-86M), Lim-6 (MiG-17), SNJ-4/T-6 and a T-34.

By Saturday late afternoon the weather had cleared enough for some flights to happen. A WWII veteran got a chance to fly in a TBM; his last flight in one was 72 years ago.

As modelers, we all look for details. Yes, it's a TBM-3, but what version? Since most of these were fire bombers after their military service, they have been restored to warbirds. Two did not have dorsal gun turrets, and one of those had the ventral gunner's sighting windows. Some had fully retractable tailhooks, while others had non-retractable. Also, the cowl flaps are different for a -3 and a -3E. It is safe to say they are all General Motors Avengers!

Where they have been, and what they have done in all these years, speaks very well for a design that first flew in 1941. Thank you to the owners/operators of all these aircraft for sharing them with us.

Dear members,


