



#### TANK KITS WITH INTERIORS

Last issue, I showed some shots of blown up tanks. This issue is about the kits of those tanks.

The first thing you will notice is the size of the boxes. These monsters have a lot of parts, so they are not a weekend project. The level of detail varies a little. The Panthers by **Takom** are extensive. Except for some wiring, nothing jumps our as a gross omission. I am not as familiar with the **RMF** M1A1/A2, but it looks to be fairly complete and their Tiger looks good also.














The **Miniart** T-54/55 series has an engine, but no transmission.



Here are some images from the instruction sheets. In order are the Tiger I, M1A1, Panther, and Tiger II.

















There are no soft tracks in these kits. They are all single link or length and link. The **RFM** kits have tracks which should be workable if assembled correctly.






The **Takom** Tiger II kits have non-working single links packaged ready for assemble like the **DML** "Smart Track". The Panthers have a length and link, with a jig to help get everything in place.





The **Miniart** T-54/55 has single links on the tree.



As you can see, these kits will lend themselves to being broken apart. The Tiger I, Tiger II, and M1A1/A2 have bath tub hulls. The others have multi-part hulls. The M1A1 has separate blow roof panels for the turret. The two flat sections of the T-54/55 turret roof are separate, so they can also be done blown off.

Of course, these are not the only tank kits with interiors and probably won't be the last. All told, there are over thirty

other tanks and armored car kits with interiors of one level or another; even more when you count gun breeches and seats. I keep hoping to see an M4 Sherman.

# BATHTUB ADMIRALS

The Annual—"Because I Don't Have Time for Anything Else Before Nationals"—Kit Review

It's not comprehensive but you get what you pay for.

**Hobby** Boss



The *Pegasus* class hydrofoil was developed for coastal work and as a response to things like the Soviet *Osa*, and *Tarantul* missile boats. Six were built but plans were for a

much larger class with countries like Germany and Italy also buying some.

For a long time, the only available kit was a Dragon 1/700<sup>th</sup> scale version packaged with the *Oliver Hazard Perry* class frigate. Orange Hobby and White Ensign have put out resin kits in 1/350<sup>th</sup>. This kit is 1/200<sup>th</sup> so it makes for a more substantial model at just under 8" long and, being from Hobby Boss, has a lot of fiddley detail. It looks good in the box. The real trick is how to display it under way in hydrofoil mode!



They're also releasing a  $1/35^{th}$  scale version of the Molch midget.

# <u>Kajika</u>



This kit of the *Kirishima* completes the WW I, as-built set of models for the Japanese *Kongo* class battlecruisers. The previous kits have been well received for their quality.

#### Aoshima





Aoshima has released two additional subjects. Both are famous for activity against German ships in the early war. *Exeter* was involved in sinking *Graf Spee* and *Dorsetshire* (arguably) applied the finishing blow to *Bismarck* via torpedoes.

There seems to be a theme here of 'British ships we sank in WW II'. (Remember the *Hermes* kit last year?) Anyway, these kits are welcome additions. Except for the old Matchbox kit of *Exeter*, these are the first plastic kits in this scale. Even the resin kits have become scarce. The *Exeter* kit also includes a kit of the destroyer *Inazuma* that hit *Exeter* with torpedoes during the Second Battle of the Java Sea and later rescued some of the crew.

Aoshima has not been shy about re-boxing and expanding from a base kit. There's already an announced 'early' *Dorsetshire* which should definitely tie to the *Bismarck* chase. This version of *Exeter* looks quite different from the version at the Battle of the River Platte which needed major repairs afterwards.

There were many County class cruisers active in WW II and these will probably all be kitted with the necessary parts changes. Since the Counties were built in four distinct blocks, there are variations that must be accounted for rather than taking the same kit and just slapping a new name on the box. Most companies now recognize that and take care of it.

### **Trumpeter**










All of these are essentially scale-downs of the 1/350<sup>th</sup> versions of these ships. The first three are available but the *Kitty Hawk* is still a few months away.



This one, though, caught me by surprise. Apparently there is going to be a 1/350<sup>th</sup> scale *Exeter* and *York* in the future. There appears to be a trend here for British cruisers, long ignored by everyone but Airfix, are going to be popping up everywhere. Other place-holders indicate 350<sup>th</sup> scale *Baltimores* (two configurations), a 1944 *Ranger* to go with the 1942 version from last year and several Italian cruisers and battleships.

The only caveat here is that some of these announcements are over a year old and still no kit.





Trumpeter has also jumped into the *Nelson/Rodney* pool with Meng by issuing 1/700<sup>th</sup> scale kits of these ships. They don't appear to be re-boxes of the Meng kits, but I haven't seen one in person yet.

These two ships were some of the better kits released by Tamiya thirty years ago, so this may not be as significant an improvement over them as with some of the other new releases. Thus, you may be

## Revell Germany



This 1/700<sup>th</sup> scale release of the WW I *Konig* is almost certainly a re-box of the ICM kit given the display base is identical. It also means there will probably be releases of the other three ships in the class. The ICM version I have really looks nice in the box. I just need time to build it and deal with all that rigging!

#### Hasegawa



Hasegawa, Tamiya and a few others have been releasing new kits of WW II Japanese destroyers. Most are legitimately new kits and are improvements on their earlier versions or the Skywave versions of that ship.







What you have to watch out for is not accidentally picking up the earlier '70's vintage kit that has been resurrected and reboxed. For example, the middle box is a re-box of the top, original *Yugumo* in modern packaging while the bottom is a very nice new kit that I just picked up. About the only give-away is that the re-boxes use the same artwork as the 1970's version.

Since the Japanese companies aren't shy about using a mold from a competitor, even that isn't a sure sign that it is a new kit. If you are interested in one of these, try to find a review that verifies that it really is a new mold before buying.

# Very Fire





Following the *Missouri*, Very Fire has added *Iowa* to the 1/350<sup>th</sup> line. There is also supposed to be a *New Jersey* coming as well.

# **Flyhawk**





HMS *Legion* is an L class pre-war destroyer. She had a short career before being sunk during air attacks on Malta. She may be most famous as 'that destroyer' alongside the sinking *Ark Royal*.

Flyhawk had put out the normal two versions of the kit. There is the basic kit and there is a deluxe version with PE and additional parts.

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
