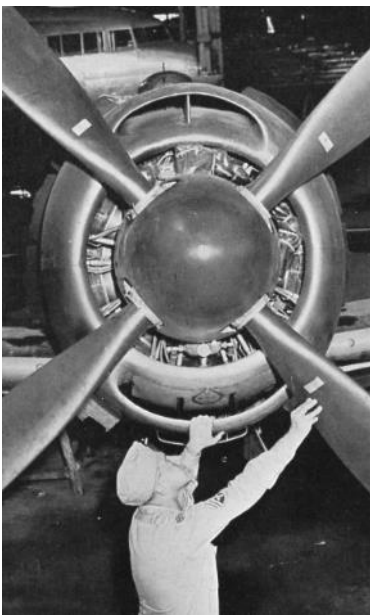

The National Museum of the Pacific War

About 80 miles West of Austin Texas is the small town of Fredericksburg, which happened to be the town that Chester Nimitz was born and raised. It is also home to the world class museum of the Pacific War. Settled by Germans in the 1830's, Fredericksburg has great restaurants and shops along with several other museums. When you purchase a ticket to the Pacific War Museum, it includes a visit to the Admiral Nimitz Museum, the George Bush Gallery, Japanese Garden of Peace, Memorial Courtyard, the Pacific Combat Zone (reenactor's perform demonstrations on weekends) and the Plaza of Presidents. All this for one price and good for two days.



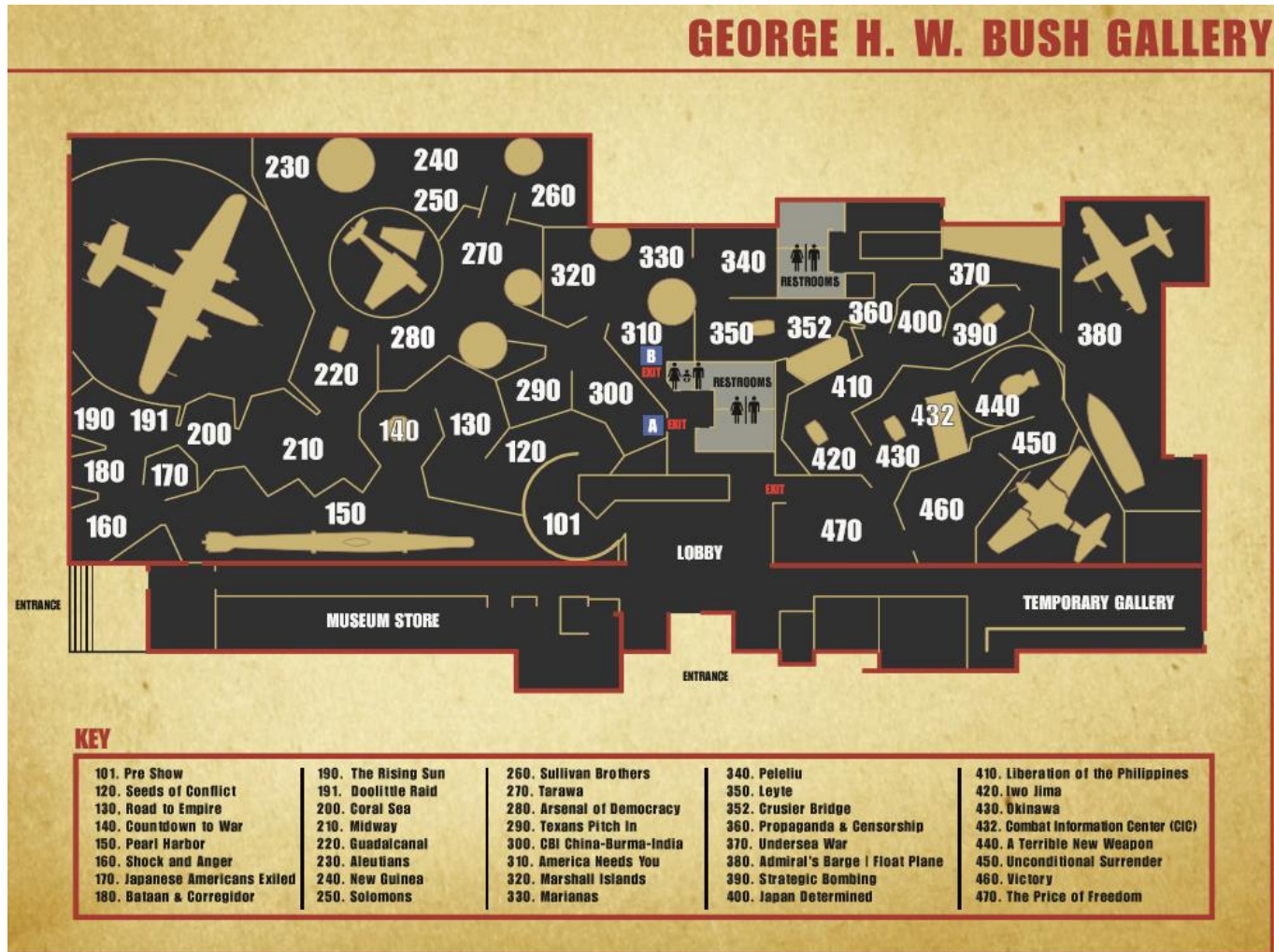
There are four separate buildings covering six acres, starting with the actual hotel that the Nimitz family owned and is now a museum dedicated to Nimitz's life from birth in the late 1800's to his career in the Navy including the important part he played in WWII as the Navy Commander in Chief Pacific Fleet - CINCPACFLT.

The Bush Gallery is the largest building and is full of rare artifacts, displays, dioramas, and interactive kiosks (see map below of the areas). You could easily spend an entire day in this building alone.

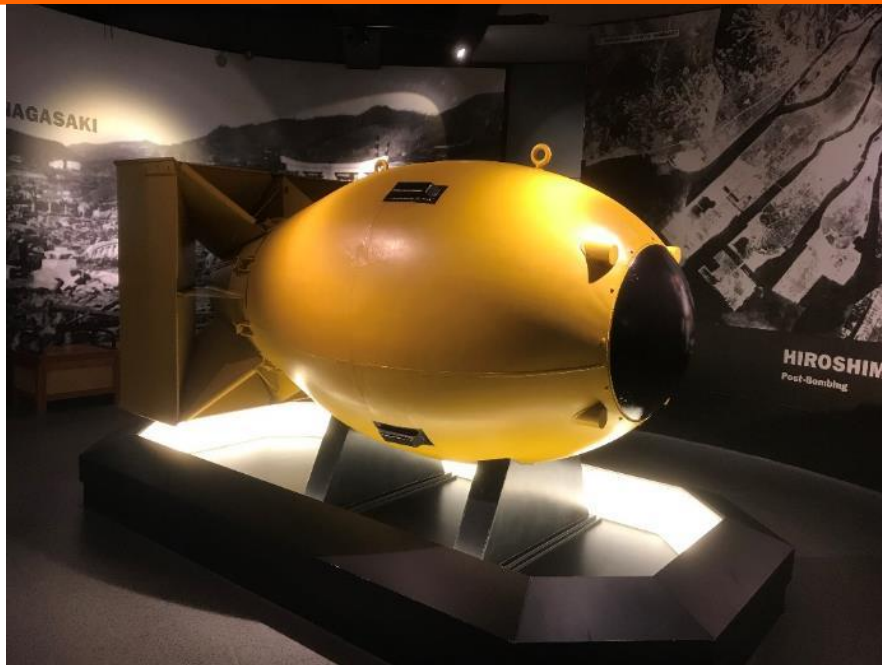

I departed Long Beach at 0'dark-thirty headed for Campo, a border town, in San Diego County. Along the way I picked up fellow modelers David Okamura and Dain Leese. It was overcast when we reached San Diego (Campo is 50 miles east of San Diego) and as we headed into the Cuyamaca Mountains, it began to rain. However the weather forecast for Campo was partly cloudy, no rain; we hoped the weatherman got it right! We planned to meet two model railroading friends, Dustin and Kevin, at the Pacific Southwest Railway Museum there. We exited Hwy 8 at Buckman Springs Rd and went south to the intersection with Campo Rd (Hwy 94) at Cameron Corners. Campo was less than mile south, we had made good time, about two and a half hours, and had about 30 minutes to kill before the museum opened. There were a couple of options for breakfast in Cameron Corners: a modern Sinclair station with a Subway or a funky taco stand adjacent to a rustic gas station/store. I voted for the taco stand plus the gas at the rustic store was \$.15 cheaper than across the street at Sinclair.

In 1927, the Pullman Company created six expensive cars in the Explorer series for private service. *Robert Peary* was used by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt during 1934-36. The all steel car has a galley, stewards' quarters, a conference/dining room, four staterooms, a shower, solarium-lounge, and open observation platform. It weighs 98 tons and rides on six-wheel trucks with extra springs.

Camp Lockett

Due to trouble with Indians and Mexican outlaws, there had been a military presence on and off in the Campo area since before the Civil War. Camp Lockett was constructed in 1941 and became the base of operations for the 10th Cavalry Regiment which was charged with guarding the border during World War II. The 10th was an African-American regiment, the legendary Wild West "Buffalo Soldiers," that had fought Indians, Poncho Villa, and guerillas in the Philippines. In 1944 the 10th Cavalry was shipped out to North Africa and deactivated. Although trained as combat soldiers and with a proud tradition as fighting men, they were assigned to a service support role. I think that was an unworthy end for such a historic unit.

The famous 10th Cavalry "Buffalo Soldiers" were closely associated with the career of Gen. John Pershing and were the source of his nickname "Black Jack!"





Exploring Along the Border

In 1942, a veteran's convalescent hospital and an Italian POW camp were added to Camp Lockett. There are plans to create a county park and military museum on the site and we saw a collection of soft-skinned WWII era vehicles stored on property closed to the public. Unfortunately, time did not permit us to explore Camp Lockett on this trip but you may learn more about the camp here:

Motor Transport Museum

The museum has been housed in the historic Campo Feldspar Mill since 1987 and over 200 vehicles can be seen on the grounds. Inside the mill is a complete fabrication shop where the vehicles are restored and displayed. There were a couple of old guys working

there who really knew old trucks and obviously had a passion for restoring them. This is a great resource for vehicle modelers because it's OK to photograph, climb on, touch, and measure everything in the yard. Admission is free but contributions are welcome.



The Campo Mill is a 9 story tall building built in 1925 by Standard Sanitary Manufacturing Company to process feldspar. Feldspar is a mineral used in the manufacture of porcelain bathtubs, sinks, and toilets.

Control panel looks like something out of a mad scientist's lab with large knife switches and brass gauges. I think our leader Dave Frederick would like to have one of these!

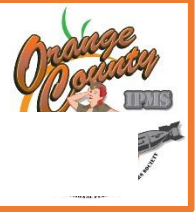

Pioneers Park Museum

We left Campo about 1 pm headed for the Pioneers Park Museum in Imperial, CA which was about a one hour drive to the east in the Imperial Valley. There is a locomotive there that I wanted to photograph and measure for a model (I'll perhaps report on that in the future). As we came down from the mountains, we entered the Anza-Borrego desert. Near Ocotillo we spotted a couple of Idaho, Northern & Pacific locomotives sitting in the desert. Don't know what the story is behind them, they are a long way from home, but there is an interesting drone video of them online:

Imperial Irrigation District locomotive #151

Locomotive #151 is the reason I wanted to visit this museum. Built by Alco-Cooke in 1918, it is one of three locomotives that hauled rock from the Pilot Knob Quarry to maintain the levees along the Colorado River and irrigation canals that brought water to the Imperial Valley. It could pull up to 20 pneumatically operated, side-dump cars.

It was retired (1947) after the opening of the All American Canal rendered the levees and canals in Mexico unnecessary and was displayed at the Imperial County Fairgrounds for many years. It was restored to operating condition and appeared at Rail Fair 1991 in Sacramento. It's in a sorry state today with parts missing and I doubt it will ever run again. While we were looking at 100 year old machines, we heard the unmistakable scream of fighter aircraft approaching. Eight F/A 18s flew directly over in a "W" formation. The planes were painted gray, not the Blue Angels, so some other hot shots were definitely showing off their skills at close formation flying.

At this point, Kevin and Dustin decided to head for home. Dustin wanted to try to find some abandoned trains in the mountains near old Highway 80 (and he found them, more about that later). Dain, David and I continued on to the Colorado River to see what was left of the Imperial Irrigation District "Levee Line" where locomotive #151 had spent its working life.

Andrade



Andrade is a border crossing on the California side of the Colorado River opposite Yuma, AZ. It's not much of a town, just a large Indian Casino, gas station and abandoned RV park at the base of Pilot Knob Mountain.

The old quarry at Pilot Knob. Loco #151 hauled rock from this site to maintain about 50 miles of levees below the Mexican border.

Why is Hanlon Heading of interest? This is where the great flood of 1905 began that created the Salton Sea. The Alamo Canal once diverted water from the Colorado River to the Imperial Valley. The water followed the lay of the land southwest into Mexico then back north to re-enter the US at Calexico. The original wooden gates were destroyed by the flood and replaced by this substantial concrete structure. Tracks were laid across the top to allow trains from the Pilot Knob quarry to pass over it to maintain the levees. Hanlon Heading was abandoned after the opening of the All American Canal (1942).



The Colorado River swept away the original wooden gates to the Alamo Canal and the entire flow of the river entered the irrigation system of the Imperial Valley. For 2 years the entire flow of the Colorado flooded the valley.

Looking east towards the levee and beyond to the Colorado River. Rock trains passed over these rails on Hanlon Heading to maintain the levees.



Pneumatically operated side dump cars delivering rock to a levee. Locomotive #151 could pull 15-20 such cars.)



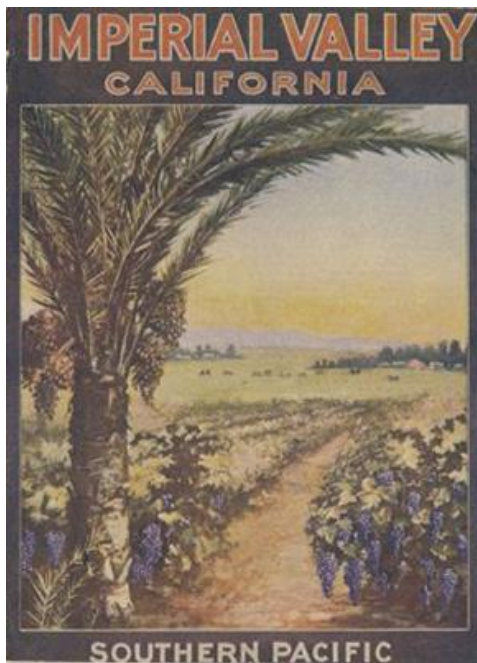

Time to turn around and head for home. Rather than back track through San Diego, we decided to go see where the Colorado flood water ended up, the Salton Sea. We returned to Imperial Valley via Hwy 8 then took Old Hwy 111 north to Niland.

Niland

Niland is the northernmost town in the Imperial Valley and was once the gateway to the valley. The Southern Pacific RR was granted extensive lands in Imperial Valley for extending a branchline south from Imperial Junction to Calexico. SP then sold the land to farmers.



The Southern Pacific Co. had extensive real estate holdings in the Imperial Valley.

A town began to grow at Imperial Junction around the railroad depot. "Niland" was created from "Nile Land" by some real estate promoter, that the lands being offered for sale were as rich as those of the River Nile. Once an important town, Niland is now a



community of dilapidated buildings, old trailers and junk vehicles. But some signs of its former importance do remain and it is home to the Tomato Festival! Niland was once an important junction on the Southern Pacific railroad and the gateway to the Imperial Valley.

Across the street from the SP depot, the First National Bank at Main St. and Niland Ave. was ready to make loans to purchase farmlands and equipment.



Adjacent to the bank, these businesses provided essential goods and services. Today this part of town is virtually abandoned, as the commercial center has shifted west along Hwy 111.

Across from the bank block on Niland Ave was once this substantial structure. Only a corner wall and ornate columns remain.



We left the Imperial Valley via Hwy 111 along the eastern shore of the Salton Sea towards Coachella. The highway parallels the Union Pacific Yuma Sub-division "Sunset Route" which was very busy. Numerous trains moving in both directions.

Bombay Beach on the Salton Sea was once a popular resort for boaters and fishermen. But the pollution of the Salton Sea has killed the resort. About 300 people still live in this ghost town.

Will there be a return trip in the future? Well, Dustin found the "lost trains" at Jacumba Hot Springs. So we want to go back and spend a little time there.

Miniature Engineering Craftsmanship Museum

Our intrepid president, Dave Frederick, mentioned something at our last meeting that caught the interest of a number of our members. This is the "The Miniature Engineering Craftsmanship Museum" in Carlsbad CA, run by The Joe Martin Foundation for Exceptional Craftsmanship. I have been to this museum and it turned out to be more than I expected.

This is located in Carlsbad CA just down the road from the LegoLand amusement park. It is in an industrial building area, so it can be somewhat hard to find. The full address is 3190 Lionshead Avenue Carlsbad, California 92010. They have a website: <http://craftsmanshipmuseum.com/>

The museum is open Tuesday thru Saturday, check the website for holiday closures. There is no fee to go to the museum but they do have a donation box.

I went to check it out about five years after learning that it existed. I expected the working steam engines, a few flying models and a ship model or two. It is a lot more than that. There are a number of areas of our hobby plus a few that it may only touch on. Items in this museum are not built from kits. They range from 1/16 scale metal aircraft by Young C. Park (you have seen the Corsair and Mustang in Finescale Modeler) to a 1/6 scale 1932 Duesenberg SJ by Louis Chenot to miniature working firearms to fully operational miniature motors. There are cars, ships, motorcycles, tractors, flying models, RC boats, dollhouses and locomotives.



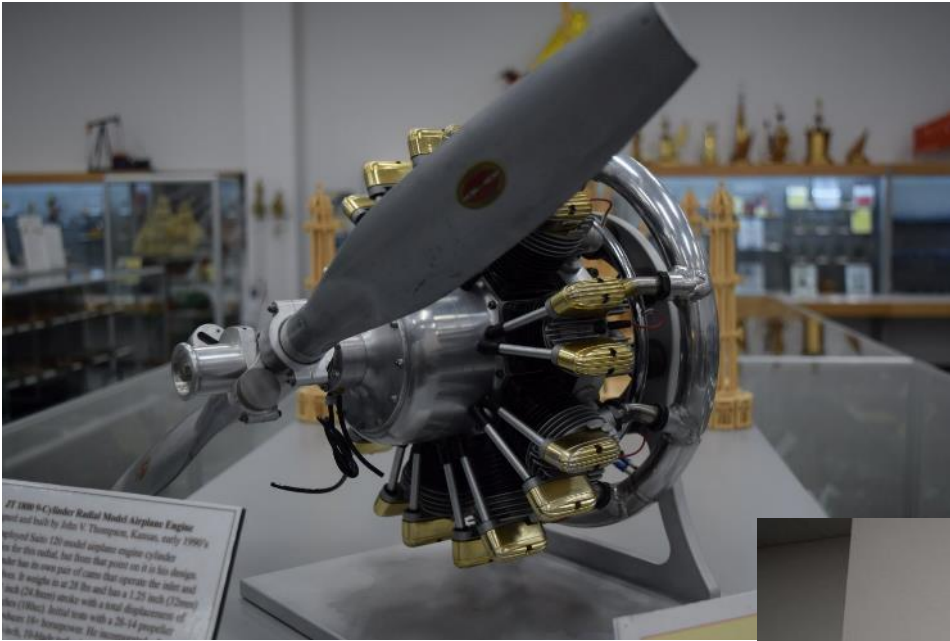
Miniature Engineering Craftsmanship Museum

All of the items on view display very high levels of craftsmanship. My conservative estimate is that there are 750 to 1,000 items on display in a very well-lit building. I think that Mr. Chenot's Duesenberg SJ is worth the visit alone. They have daily demos running some of the miniature engines three time a day.

I have included a number of my own photos to give everyone a sample of what is on display. These are only a small part of an extraordinary exhibition. The museum rotates display, so something that I photographed may not be on display any longer. *SM*
