The contest is hosted by the San Diego IPMS and IPMS San Diego Model Car Club with support from the San Diego Air & Space Museum (SDASM). The contest has 2 themes,

"Poke the Bear, Soviet Union 1917-1991" and

"60 Years of the Chevrolet Impala"

As well as 37 additional categories, other special awards include "Best Tamiya Model" and "Best 1/48 Stearman" bi-plane model. The winner of the "Best Stearman" model gets to ride in the 1:1 scale real Stearman once owned by Steve McQueen.

In addition to the contest, tables will be available for non-competitive display models. The event will be held at the SDASM Gillespie field annex along with their swap meet. 1/72 scale Tamiya "Silver Plate" Ki-61 Tony By Julian English

Tamiya has come out with several excellent 1/48 scale kits lately, but just last month, they released the new 1/72 scale Ki-61 Tony Japanese Army fighter. Along with the regular Ki-61 kit, they also released a special edition of this new kit with silver plating and special camouflaged decals with markings representing the aircraft of fighter ace Lt. Shinzo Takashima of the 244 Air Group in Japan, 1945.



Many of the Japanize army (IJA) aircraft had a natural metal finish with field applied camouflaged of wavy lines or blotches of various colors of green paint. The silver plating and camo decals represent something new for

represent something new for model kits, at least for an aircraft model, and the quality of the plating and decals in this kit is very high.



It comes with 2 silver plated sprues and one clear sprue, two sheets of decals and a special instruction sheet for the assembly of the "silver plate" edition.

One document in the kit is a special instruction sheet for "cementing the metal plated parts" they also say if you are missing any plated parts – you're out of luck. I guess there may not be many of these plated kits available?

The silver plating is very durable and holds up to handling, cleaners, glue, and solvents. In fact, you need to scrape off

Tamiya's newer kits are known for their excellent fit and detail and this new Ki-61 is no different. The cockpit interior is a detailed gem with over 10 individual parts that make up the cockpit tub. The assembly slides right into the bottom of the fuselage. The alignment of all the parts is perfect so that no seam filler is needed.



the plating on the mating surfaces before you can glue them together.

The plating also creates a few challenges to the build process. Despite the unique alignment of the fuselage halves, the seams on the top and bottom of the model require sanding and removal of the plating. This requires repainting of these areas -I used Alclad polished aluminum, and the match was very good.

The decals are excellent and cover all the camouflaged upper surfaces. The only areas that need painting are the black anti-glare panel, propeller, and the red tail (along with various small parts and the interior). The instructions seam to say you need to use enamel paint to cover the silver plating, however, I used acrylic paint and had no issues and the durability was good after coating with a layer of clear coat.

Masking over the plating was no problem and caused no issues with damaging the coating. I decided to paint the Hinomaru thinking that the two layers of decals would be too

thick especially with the experience I have had in the past with Tamiya decals. However, this was not necessary as the decals are thin and laid over each other very well (there are several decals that overlay the camo decals - making two layers of decals).

Camo decals on top, aircraft markings below I was concerned that the decals would look strange when applied as they cover the entire wing and fuselage and the clear carrier film covers most of the good looking silver plating. However, they look good and I was surprised that the carrier film is invisible after drying. The camo decals are a little hard to apply because they are so big. You must be very careful to get them in the right place before they set up (working time is not long and alignment is critical as the green patches overlap on the sides, top and wing root). They are very accurate, and the fit is good. The decals are a little delicate so be careful with masking tape or rough handling (Yes, I ripped off a small part of the decal on the left wing and I had to paint the missing green patches).

As I said, the camouflaged decals are something new for me, but painting the field applied type Japanize camo is hard to do in 1/72 scale, so the decals are a nice alternative.

Conclusion: This kit is a pleasure to build, but you must plan your assembly and painting carefully to minimize damage the silver plating. The decals are great, but also require a lot of care when applying them. One drawback is the closed canopy that hides the detail of the cockpit (I cut mine open and Vac-U-Formed a new center section). The overall effect is impressive in this small scale – I highly recommend this kit. JE

Nieuport Builders

Old Route 66 Part Two Amboy to Barstow By Foster Rash





Picking up from last month, Kevin, a modeling friend from the California South Coast On30 Modular Narrow Gauge Group, and 1 drove old Route 66 from Needles to Barstow in search of modeling inspiration. It seemed we had barely got started on Route 66 when we encountered a roadblock at

Fenner, CA. Southwest of Fenner, the old highway was washed out at several places. Since Route 66 is no longer maintained, Caltrans had closed it. Following the advice of a trucker, we detoured west on 1-40 and returned to Route 66 via Kelbaker Rd.

<u>Amboy</u>



We found Route 66 east to Cadiz, closed at the Kelbaker junction. However, just as the trucker had told us, the road west to Amboy was open. We headed west to Amboy. There was a settlement in Amboy as early as 1858 but it was not named until Kingman established his "alphabet water stops" for the railroad in 1883.

In 1916 Amboy was a station of such operating importance as to have two sidings, a turntable and four section houses. This

photo was taken in 1968. When Amboy was closed in 1971, it was the last open agency between Needles and Barstow.

The creation of Route 66 stimulated an increase in the population of Amboy. The iconic Roy's Motel opened in 1938 and has been a location for many movies and TV commercials. Some of the cottages at Roy's are restored and open for viewing and the gas station and coffee shop were open for business. We were not the only tourists there and Roy's seemed to be doing a good business in Route 66 T shirts and memorabilia.



Bagdad

Bagdad was the next stop down the road. There has been a great deal of mining in this area. The rich Bagdad Chase and Dale mining districts are to the southwest.



Roy's Motel and Café is a Route 66 landmark.

Amboy Crater is a 6,000-year-old extinct volcano located to the west of Amboy. Michael Bare, did you know that it was used as a location in the 1959 movie *Journey to the Center of the Earth*? Fires were set inside the crater to simulate an eruption.



Bagdad appears to have been more than just a water stop as there are several tracks on both sides of the station. Amboy crater in distance, on right behind telephone pole.

The famous Bagdad Cafe was demolished in 1991. But the cult-classic movie "Bagdad Cafe" was actually filmed in Newberry Springs.

Bagdad is now just the name of a railroad siding. Nothing remains of the town but a few foundations and a cemetery.





West of Bagdad was another water stop, Siberia. There was once a service station there.

A few foundations and rubble are all that remain of Siberia. Siberia remains as a place name for the railroad siding there.

Between Siberia and Ludlow, Ash Hill is a popular train watching location.

<u>Ludlow</u>

Ludlow in the early 1960s. Richfield Oil merged with Atlantic Refining to form ARCO in 1966. See the truck with the Orange cab at the Richfield station?





The old truck and gas station are still there although neither are in operation today.

Ludlow is my favorite of these little desert road stops. It has on off-ramp on 1-40 and still has an open gas station, motel and coffee shop. I first visited the area in the 1970s on a dirt bike trip exploring the Bagdad Chase mining area. Ludlow had a large *mid-century modern* style gas station-restaurant and a cluster of "new" buildings on the highway, but more interesting was the old town along the railroad tracks.

There were some old stores, an auto repair garage and numerous other abandoned structures in the area on that first visit.



Ludlow Mercantile, built in 1908, was the most prominent structure on the old Main Street (Photo taken before the 1999 earthquake).



In 1999, on our way home from a railfan trip to ride the narrow gauge in Colorado and New Mexico, we pulled off the highway to cruise around old Ludlow. The old Ludlow Mercantile building was still standing proud. That night a major earthquake rocked the area and the front of Ludlow Mercantile collapsed. Very sad.

The Ludlow Mercantile building is still standing – at the moment.

Ludlow Mercantile was owned by one of Ludlow's most colorful citizens, "Ma" Preston. Born Mathilde Vigneron in France in 1850, she married and moved to America where her husband found work in Los Angeles. Sometime in the 1880s, she left her husband and moved to the boomtown of Calico. In 1888 she

married Thomas Preston, a Calico saloonkeeper. Mathilde was a large woman with a loud mouth, the miners called her "Big Mary," and she wore the pants in the family. She learned the saloon and gambling business, and ran a brothel on the side.



The only known photograph of Ma Preston, clearly taken without her knowledge, a few years before she retired to France with more than \$250,000, the equivalent of about \$3 million today.

Around 1900 she pulled up stakes in Calico and with Tom, moved to Ludlow. There she invested in a saloon, pool room, hotel, restaurant, store and mining

claims. The money all belonged to Mathilde, everything was in her name. She loaned money to John Denair to build the Ludlow Mercantile Company building in 1908 but foreclosed on the store when he was unable to meet the payments. She then continued to operate the store herself. By that time she was in her 60's and known around town as "Ma" Preston. In 1920, at the age of 70, she sold all of her holdings for the equivalent today of almost \$3 million and returned to France. She died in Paris in 1926

The Murphy Brothers owned the store next to the Ludlow Mercantile and bought the business from Ma Preston when she moved to France.

Ludlow was once a busy town served by three railroads: AT&SF, Tonopah & Tidewater, and Ludlow & Southern. It began as a water stop in 1883, but there was no water source

in Ludlow and water was hauled in from Newberry Springs. From 1906 to 1940, Ludlow was the southern terminal of the Tonopah and Tidewater Railroad.

Tonopah & Tidewater shops and supplies were headquartered in Ludlow. Train in background is headed north to Baker and on to Death Valley Junction.

The T&T was created during the gold rushes in Tonopah and Goldfield, NV. It never made it to "Tidewater" (San Diego) and terminated with a connection to the AT&SF at Ludlow. The T&T's largest customer was the



Pacific Coast Borax Company mine at Ryan in Death Valley. The Death Valley RR from Ryan connected with the T&T at Death Valley Junction. The Tonopah & Tidewater fell on hard times when Pacific Coast Borax closed the mine at Ryan and moved to richer deposits at Boron, CA. The T&T was sold for scrap in 1940. The Ludlow and Southern Railway transported ore from the Bagdad Chase mines to the AT&SF connection at Ludlow.

Openinge Contraction

Large dark roof, two story building left of center was the Depot of the Tonopah & Tidewater RR. Main St. paralleled the tracks and in the next block (center of photo) you can make out the portico and roofline of the Ludlow Mercantile building. AT&SF station is obscured by



trees at the far end of the yard. The long string of tank cars on the Ludlow & Southern siding (on right) are probably carrying water for Bagdad Chase.

The original AT&SF station in Ludlow is no longer there

From the 1920s, Ludlow benefitted



from increased commerce from travelers on Route 66 and became the largest town between Needles and Barstow. By the 1940s, local mining and railway activity had wound down and



the town survived by supplying the needs of travelers on Route 66. The town center shifted from along the railroad tracks to the highway.

Several trains came through while we were exploring. These guys were moving at a good clip! The two battered gondolas on adjacent siding were being loaded with scrap metal.

The AT&SF is now the BNSF (Burlington

Northern Santa Fe) and the line through Ludlow is very busy. But the diesel locomotives don't need to stop for water and just pass through a ghost town now.

Bagdad Chase Mining District

John Suter was the agent of the A&P railroad in Ludlow and was charged with finding a source of water. Searching in the Bullion Mtns. to the south, between Ludlow and Bagdad, he discovered several promising outcrops of gold and copper ore. He filed claims, began mining operations and the gold rush was on! In the late 1890s, Suter sold his mines and claims to a group of investors which included New York banker Benjamin Chase. This group bought up other claims around Bagdad and Ludlow which they organized as the Bagdad Chase Gold Mining Company. Chase was also president of the Ludlow & Southern Railway, which had been completed in 1903 to transport ore from the Bagdad Chase mines to the AT&SF at Ludlow. These mines were the largest gold and copper producers in San Bernardino County.



This interesting Ludlow & Southern relic was created by combining the chassis of a worn out steam locomotive with the internal combustion engine from a Holt tractor. What a great subject for a model!

Daggett

Daggett, named for John Daggett the Lt. Governor of California, came into being as a mining town in the 1880s after the discovery of silver in the mines near Calico to the north. The Waterloo Mining Railroad hauled silver ore from the Calico Mtns to Daggett. When the Southern Pacific built the line from Mojave to Needles, Daggett became the terminal for the twenty-mule team borax wagons from Death Valley.

Daggett was once a significant railroad town as evident by the size of the AT&SF depot that was once there.

By the 1890s, Daggett was a town with a number of stores, restaurants, hotels and saloons. There was even a lumberyard and a Chinese restaurant! In 1903, the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad (later acquired by the Union Pacific Railroad) built their line from Las Vegas through Daggett to Los Angeles.

Borax mill at Daggett. See the narrow gauge train dumping ore from the trestle in front of the mill?

Borax was discovered near Calico and the Pacific Coast Borax Company built the narrow gauge Borate and Daggett Railroad in 1898 to haul the ore from the company town Borate. But after 1911 when richer



borax deposits were discovered in Death Valley at Ryan, all the mining operations were moved up there. Borax from Ryan was shipped on the Tonopah & Tidewater to the AT&SF junction at Ludlow and Daggett began to go into decline. There are a few interesting historic structures clustered along Santa Fe St. (Route 66) by the railroad tracks. Most of the homes in town appear abandoned, several are burned out and there are abandoned cars and junk everywhere.

Daggett Garage was once an engine house for the Borate & Daggett Railroad. It was moved to Daggett from Borate when the railroad closed

The Daggett Garage was originally the engine house for this Heisler Heislers were gear locomotive. driven steam locomotives popular with mining and logging operations because the low gearing allowed them to pull loads and grades that rod locomotives could not. The trade-off Heislers speed, was typically operated at less than 10 mph.

The old engine house has been used as a stable, garage and grocery store. Today it is being used for storage by the adjacent junkyard. There were a WWII era Jeep and old Buick in the yard that I would have liked to taken home. What a model this would make.

The Stone Hotel, built in 1875, was originally a two story building with a glass-domed lobby. The second floor was destroyed by fire in 1908. Notable guests of the hotel have included prospector Death Valley Scotty, John Daggett, and John Muir.





People's General Store adjacent to the Stone Hotel would make an interesting model.

General store appears to have originally been constructed with board and batten siding and covered over later with clapboards; Great patina on the metal roof. You might call it a study in weathering.

Desert Market was built in 1908 and is still in business. In fact, it is the only store in town!



This home was once an office for a land development company. Built in 1926, the unusual roof was designed to attract the attention of travelers on Route 66 and to interest them in purchasing lots in the area.

<u>Barstow</u>



Barstow promotes Route 66 tourism

Leaving Daggett, we headed west on 1-40 and exited on Main St (old Rte 66) in Barstow. The settlement of the Barstow area began in the late 1830s. The Mojave River channel is usually dry with most of its flow underground. Due to the geology east of Barstow, the river surfaces there and formed year round ponds and

grapes grew wild along the banks. Early travelers on the Old Spanish Trail from Santa Fe and the Mormon Road from Salt Lake City called the area Fish Ponds or Grapevine. By the 1870s, trading posts had been established there for travelers and for the miners searching for gold and silver in the surrounding mountains.

Robert Waterman was a prospector and mining developer from San Bernardino who discovered silver a few miles north of present day Barstow. In 1881, he formed a mining partnership and built large stamp mill to process the ore from his mine and others in the area. Waterman's mine and mill employed 100 men and produced \$1.7 million. Other mills

were built in the area and the settlement around the mills came to be called Waterman. Waterman became wealthy and was elected Governor of California in 1887.

Randsburg-Santa Fe Reduction Co. mill in Barstow was built to process ore from Randsburg Mining District but the Bagdad Chase mines became their biggest customer.

When the Southern Pacific railroad came to town, they named their station Waterman Junction. When the AT&SF acquired the Waterman to Needles line, they renamed the station Barstow in honor of the president of the AT&SF, William Barstow Strong.

Today Barstow is a busy rail center



Driving west on Main St, it seems like every other business has worked "Route 66" into their name. Most of the buildings in this part of town have a bland 40s-50s style of architecture and have seen better days. We turned north on 1st St. which took us to an interesting, old steel bridge over the rail yard to the Casa del Desierto, a restored Harvey House. (Terry Huber gave a newsletter report on train watching at this location a couple of years ago.)

There was a great deal of activity in the Barstow yard. Good train watching location.

The Casa del Desierto station and Harvey House was built in 1911 and closed in 1973. The derelict was bought by the City of Barstow and restored.



Harvey Girls were the epitome of efficient, courteous service

Fred Harvey operated a chain of restaurants and hotels in the Southwest under contract to the

AT&SF railroad. Harvey's company, including the famous waitresses known as Harvey Girls, successfully brought high standards of civility and dining to "the Wild West."

The Western America Railroad Museum, located on the side of the Harvey House, preserves the history of railroading in the Pacific Southwest. Inside the museum are displays of railroad timetables, uniforms, tools and various other railroad items. There are also outdoor displays of locomotives, rolling stock, and equipment that you can climb on, photograph and measure. Someone was ripping the museum on Yelp because she let her toddler climb on the equipment and he got burned by hot metal. Metal that sets in 100+ degree desert sun gets hot! She wanted safety warning labels; I guess I know now who all the dumb labels on ladders and hammers are meant for!



Ex-USMC GE 44 Ton locomotive. Remember the locomotive like this that you would often see from the 405 Fwy moving ammo cars at the Naval Weapons Station in Seal Beach?



An old heavyweight coach, blisters on roof indicate it was air conditioned. "Heavyweight" refers to the old, riveted steel passenger cars built prior to WWII. At about 85 tons per car, they are about 50% heavier than their modern "Lightweight" counterparts.

Route 66 Modeling

The purpose of the trip was to inspire some model building and so it did! I'm building a compressed version of Carty's Camp, the old motel in Needles. Whenever possible, I like to incorporate actual materials from the site of the prototype in my models. At Carty's I scooped a coffee cup of dirt and a couple of scraps of peeling plywood that I found on the ground.

Carty's Camp was still "on the bench" at the time the Newsletter went to print.

Daggett's Garage is a semi-scale version of the old engine house/garage in Daggett.

1 also modeled the old engine house/garage at Daggett. 1 took some liberties with the dimensions as it had to fit into an available space on my module. The old building

appeared to have log cabin-style criss-crossed timbers at the bottom of the west end. The "logs" in my model were cut from a large splinter from a railroad tie found along the tracks at Daggett. Using wood from a real railroad tie had the unexpected benefit of giving the building a creosote smell! Most of the prototype building is covered in corrugated metal siding. The west end is covered in a patchwork of rusty metal rectangles which appears to have been cut from old square 5 gal oil cans that had been flattened. I duplicated this with metal cut from a rusty tin can found near the railroad tracks in Daggett. I used Plastruct plastic corrugated siding for the rest of the building. The windows are Tichy castings. The faux-rust finish and weathering were achieved with several layers of acrylic paint washes followed with weathering powders. Weathering was the most fun part of this build. *FR*
