This year started out with a vacation cruse to New Zealand. After flying into Sydney Australia and spending a few days there I boarded a cruise liner for New Zealand. One of the ports was the windy city of Wellington. The city museum had a WWI exhibit called The Scale of Our War.

It was an exhibit which centered on the events of the Gallipoli campaign (1915) in Turkey during the First World War. There were several fifteen-foot-tall figures depicting the action of the conflict.



All the figures were impressive in size and detail of the pose was extremely moving in the presentation.





In addition to the figures, the Gallipoli conflict was well documented with detailed Dioramas of trench like war fare.

Something you would not see in the states is a presentation of what would happen to a soldier if a bullet hit his head or a grenade blow up next to him. The effects of the grenade are show in the x-ray soldier- note the broken leg bones.



Wellington has many tour offerings. One was the Weta studio tour, which is a New Zealand equivalent to Lucas films studio. Film Director, Peter Jackson (The Wingnut Wings WW1 model aircraft fame) made movies such as King Kong, District Nine and most important The Lord of the Rings series.

Since the Lord of the Rings was filmed entirely in New Zealand there is a tour of the filming locations for the movies. I am crouched down in the side of the path which the four hobbits where being pursued by the death rider in the first movie.





You must use your imagination as the tree for which the hobbit was under has been removed and exposed tree roots shielding them were studio props. The museum and tours were both worth seeing as New Zealand has many sights to visit. **DF**





Tamiya 1/48 Spitfire Mk.I (New Mold) By Mark Glidden



The part fit was what we have all come to expect from Tamiya by now – near perfect. I'm always amazed that Tamiya can get such close tolerances on their parts, while so many other model companies seem to endlessly struggle with it.



The cockpit was a breeze to assemble, especially given the amount of detail. You need to decide early-on if you want an open or closed canopy, as there are different cockpit side-wall parts for each configuration. There are also two different photo-etch shoulder harnesses, depending on whether you use the pilot figure.

Tamiya seem to have included a bit more photo-etch with this kit than they have in the past. Tamiya's photo-etch would always dull the sharpest cutter just getting it off the fret and require near Herculean effort to bend, this new photo-etch was very soft and malleable. It was very easy to work with, particularly when it came to forming the seat harness.

Perhaps the only real disappointment in the kit were the exhausts. Tamiya molded the ends of the exhausts separately, I assume to improve on the detail. This was something of a fail in my mind, as the exhausts are still molded solid and the ends don't fit all that cleanly. I ended-up using a modified set of Ultracast resin exhausts that were made for the original Tamiya Spitfire Mk.I.

All the parts are in the kit to build a very early Mk.I – the rod antenna mast, ring and bead gunsight, Pitot tube, windscreen, all except the wooden two-bladed propeller. No telling why Tamiya didn't include it, perhaps another version will be released? As I wanted to build a very early Mk.I, I borrowed a two-bladed prop from the recent Airfix Spitfire Mk. I kit. It was a perfect fit.

Tamiya took a rather novel approach to two areas that are often rather problematic when to alignment it comes landing and the gear horizontal stabilizers. The two landing gear legs are actually molded as one piece. The two legs are connected by what might be considered a spar, which insures the gear legs will be in alignment with each other. Mucking this up would take some effort.

The one-piece horizontal stabilizer didn't work-out quite so cleanly. When the part was slid into position and was locked in place, I found that it did not sit perfectly horizontal. It wasn't a difficult fix, just had to bend the stabilizers a bit to get them leveled out.



Building this kit was almost like therapy it went together so well – no mashing of teeth or pulling of the hair. Highly recommended for enthusiasts of the early Spitfires. *MG*



Terry's Slot Car Corner



I will attempt to kick-off a bi-monthly article on the HO (1:87) scale and larger 1:32 scale slot car racing hobby. There may be discussions to 1:24 scale cars as well. The only tie-in to scale modeling techniques I can think of is the painting and decaling of un-painted body's that are widely available, and Vac-formed Lexan shells too. **HO Scale**

Also you can add structures and buildings to

your layout available in kit form, then ground cover and landscaping scenery. There are plenty of cross-over HO train structures that can be used on the layout such as garage buildings, guard shack, ticket booths, train interlock towers (now become race central control towers.), storage sheds, photo observation towers, souvenir stands, food and beer gardens and things that you would see at the race track. Heller from Germany and JL Innovative Design offers an HO grandstand as well, all of these in kit form. The Heller grandstand is above at the title block.

I have built a few HO slot car racing layouts over the years starting with my first, thanks to my dad's help, in 1965. Back then Aurora ruled the scene with Thunder Jet 500 Model Motoring cars and Magnatraction, also other manufacturers tried to keep up, like Auto World and some others competing for a piece of the action. The layout was your basic 4 x 8 foot plywood sheet set on saw horses or better yet, a table platform underneath. This grandstand here by JL Innovative design is the Riverside Speedway Grandstand. A laser cut wood style kit.



There was an article in Boy's Life Magazine during this time that described their own buildout, including prints. This was by some accounts, the equivalent on the HO racing side as that of the Shep Paine articles and information on the plastic modeling diorama side, a revelation. The Boy's life layout (on title page) had just enough scenery and multi-level pizazz along with tight turns that you have to pay attention to racing, and would inspire more layout builders to start their own track, like myself.

Those layouts and cars are long gone however I did pick it up again in the late 1990's with the AF/X Tyco cars. I still have some of those cars from that era which I will show in photos but unfortunately no track though, that layout was a simple painted 4x8 sheet of plywood. Nowadays AFX is still the primary manufacturer with their Mega G and Mega G+ cars along with Auto World which still manufacturers the old Aurora Thunderjet 500 and the Magna-Traction reproduction cars of the 60's and 70's. They also produce a line of Top Fuel dragsters and Racing Team 18-Wheelers and trailers.




A great book on the Aurora slot car development is the Schiffer Publication by Thomas Graham, "Aurora Slot Cars". (\$35-50). It describes in great detail the early Aurora years and the Thunderjet

500. After a while along came TYCO working with AF/X (Aurora Factory Experimental) to make the 440x2 series chassis and motors of the mid 1990's shown here.

Then Mattel got involved during the trailing years, and lately Tomy was supplying the cars under their banner. The Graham book explains it all and is well worth the investment for all the details.

The most current versions of AFX includes the new Ford GT's shown here with AFX's G+ chassis. AFX also has the G chassis and narrow body lomg chassis F1 cars. AFX Racemasters in Reno are the official distributor and supplier here in the states. Evidently Tomy is out of the picture now and AFX has another supplier.

When I consider specialty cars I think of Viper Racing Orem UT. These guys build incredibly fast cars and chassis, and

the enormous amount of upgrades, all built here, in the States can put you quickly in the Open or Unlimited category of racing. Their mild "stock" chassis and motor VTR (below) can definitely put a hurt on AFX Mega G+ top speeds as-is. They also build incredible custom cars and tracks for your home. Not cheap but something that looks and performs at a professional looking level. Check them out here <u>https://viperscaleracing.com/</u>

Distressed Kit Stories

At the June Distressed kit auction I purchased an LS 1/144 scale Kawanishi "Emily" Japanese Flying Boat. I was pleased and surprised that the kit was complete and went together well. I brought it to the recent January meeting. I also bought a late model Hasegawa 1/72 scale Mitsubishi J2M3 Raiden or "Jack." I discovered it actually had two identical complete kits in the box and Julian English was interested so I let him have one of the kits. (I expect he will bring the completed model in some time this year). All in all the Raiden was a complete kit and a good build and I was satisfied with my June purchases.

Now for the December Distressed Kit auction......I bought five kits......got excited and I think I overdid it.

First Kit—A Whitley English bomber, unknown scale, maker, no instructions or decals, in a clear plastic bag. Upon inspection I found several essential parts missing so I tossed the kit.

Second Kit—a very old Tamiya 1/100 scale (rare) Soviet Ilyushin IL-28 Beagle bomber. It was a simple build yet the decals disintegrated but I had others to use and the finished kit looks good.

Third Kit—This was a Heller *Echelle* 1/72 German Messerschmitt BF 109E. *Echelle* is French for scale, and, of course, the instructions were in French, with limited English translation. Each sprue was referred to as "Bunch" 1, 2, 3, and 4. The tail fin struts were called right tail leg and left tail leg. I think the kit was from the 1960s and so I used some current decals I had to make a Rumanian BF 109E. It looks good.

Fourth Kit—This was an Airfix 1/72 scale Henschel H.S. 129 ground attack bomber. Likely from the 1970s, the kit is interesting as it can be built with two versions, one with bombs and one with the anti-tank gun. Unfortunately the one essential piece missing is the one-piece wrap-around clear canopy. I am not sure what I am going to do, though with some difficulty I have scratch-built a canopy before.....

Fifth Kit—From *Plastyk Pruszkow Parkowa 1*, Poland, a 1/72 scale 1938 Polish PZL-37A/B LOS medium bomber. The unique, <u>entirely square</u> box had significant water damage but the kit and decals were still in an unopened clear plastic bag.

The kit was a challenge as, of course, the instructions were all in Polish but the diagrams were clear and had helpful illustrated steps. Plus, amazingly the 1979 kit's decals were still good and went on without a problem using Tamiya Mark Fit. JF





Grand National Roadster Show

Rich Boyd and I recently attended the Grand National Roadster Show. Rich had scored some free passes, there were several buildings full of fine automobiles to ogle and my Haggerty card admitted us into their hospitality area for complimentary refreshments. Cheap thrills for a couple of Seniors! We went on Friday, the first day of the show, and crowds were relatively light. So it was possible to see and photograph the cars without much difficulty.



George Poteet's *3 Penny Roadster* won this year's America's Most Beautiful Roadster award. The highly detailed car has over 500 custom machined parts.

The Grand National Roadster Show began as a car show at the Oakland Exposition Building in 1949. Over the next seven decades, the Oakland Roadster show, now the Grand National Roadster Show, would become the greatest hot rod and custom car show in the world, and raise hot rods from hooligan status to an art form in the process.

The show departed the Oakland Exposition Building in 1967 for other venues before moving to the Pomona Fairplex several years ago, where it seems to have found a permanent home.

The *Niekamp Roadster* was the first winner of the America's Most Beautiful Roadster award in 1950.

The roadsters have evolved from simple home-built cars to the incredible creations of professional builders like George Barris, Ed Roth and Chip Foose. Many of today's cars

may look like vintage Fords but they are not; every panel is a one-off custom fabrication with subtle, or radical, differences from what Henry produced. They are rolling works of art conceived by

automotive designers and created by highly skilled metal workers, upholsterers and painters. If you want to win the AMBR (America's Most Beautiful Roadster) 9-foot-plus-tall trophy, you better be ready to spend a million dollars or more. This year, there were 14 roadsters vying for the trophy

Kettering Bug-Paper Model

By Murphs Models

Kettering Bug: an experimental, unmanned aerial torpedo, a forerunner of present-day cruise missiles. The prototype Bug delivered to the U.S. Army Signal Corps in 1918 near the end of the war.

Engine: 4 cylinder, 40-horsepower De Palma mass-produced by the Ford Motor Company for about \$40 each.

Fuselage: Constructed of wood laminates and papier-Mache. Wings: Were made of cardboard.

Length: 12 ft 6 in. Wingspan: 15 ft Height: 7.7 ft Loaded weight: 530 lb Cruise Speed: 50 mph Range: 75 miles

Launched using a dolly-and-track system, similar to the method used by the Wright Brothers in 1903. The Bug could fly at 50 mph. When arriving over its target a cam dropped down shutting the engine off, retracting the hold down bolts for the wings which fell off. Impact detonated the payload of 180 lb of explosives.

What makes our tours unique 2?



I would travel to Europe alone or sometimes with my older sister, and every time I went, I had a blast. Upon my return, I would share stories of the things I had seen and done, but I could never really impart in words the excitement and thrill of what I did. So I guess I have always wanted to take people to Europe to share the experience. But the real catalyst was hearing of friends and acquaintances being diagnosed with illnesses or debilitating injuries, or those diagnosed with terminal cancer or the like. At that point, I determined not to go to my maker with a long list of "would haves", "should haves" or "could haves" and that I would do and see as much in my lifetime as I possibly could.

Second, I know most people only get two weeks of vacation. When I originally conceived the trip in 2017 it started as a two-week trip. And so, two weeks eventually morphed into three, or 19 days, as it takes two days of flying to get from the U.S. to Europe and back.

Third, like many of you reading this, I developed an interest in military history at a young age. I read about and build military subjects, and I am always on board when it comes to visiting military museums, battlefields, or sites. And so, it is a subject I am passionate about, and I can't think of a better way to enjoy it



than together with like-minded enthusiasts. Which is why I challenge you to consider joining us on this trip.
