

Vice Presidents Column and March Program By Sean Fallesen



This month we're going to shine some light on the subject of Photoetched Parts.

Once a novel new way to add details too small for injection plastic and missing from kits (or to replace kit parts that are too small for injection plastic, but were injected anyway...), PE parts are now almost ubiquitous in modeling. Simple, crude, hand-drawn designs have evolved into ultra-fine, precise computer-drafted, multi-depth pieces, sometimes with the final color already on them!

PE parts soon came to be a "necessity" for any "serious" competitive modeler – so much so that it seemed as though whoever worked the most add-on sets into their build was guaranteed to be the big winner. (Resin parts too, but we're focusing on PE for now) Many bemoaned how it looked as though whoever spent the most money on detail sets was the shoe-in; how ordinary modelers on a limited budget couldn't hope to compete. We needed an "Out-Of-The-Box" category so that there would be at least some chance for awards to the classic builders. And considering the buzz among show spectators over an ultra-detailed vehicle with every panel removed and hatch opened at once, things do seem pretty grim for the "ordinary" modeler who "just likes to build."

Except... it's not quite so bleak. Any of us who have judged know quite well that a poorly done detail job will lose to a well-built out-of-the-box - regardless of what the spectator buzz sounds like. There have been many times where an out-of-the-box build has placed ahead of super-detail entries in regular competition; occasionally an exceptional "basic" build will even win a "Best Of" trophy.

So, is PE required to be a competitive modeler? Generally, no, but it sure can help elevate your game.

To elevate your game, must you buy every detail set available for your subject? No, of course not.

Is the biggest and most expensive set of detail parts guaranteed to be the best choice? Maybe... but there are other factors to consider.

"Hold on," some of you might say. "I have no interest in PE parts. I never buy any of these aftermarket addons. My kit, glue, and paint are enough for me!" Well, unless you're limiting yourself to only building older kits, I can almost guarantee that you're going to run into it eventually. Many of the newer kits include PE parts, and with increasing frequency they're NOT optional! Necessary pieces to complete the subject, with no plastic part provided – just the in-box PE fret!

So, we're going to exhibit some sample PE sets from different makers and different generations of PE history, and discuss our experiences, our techniques, and share ideas and recommendations for how to make the best use of the photoetched metal medium in our hobby. *SF*

George Creed and the Pasadena Scale Modelers held their annual show on March



3rd. This time a return to the Pasadena Convention Center on 300 S. Green St. The old room that George had used before was expanded this time and every table the Convention center had available was setup



for the show. According to George the model count was 558 models an impressive total and it certainly looked that way. Many a modeler will tell you that the competition here is quite heavy and always a good proving ground for the contest nubile.



George uses an open room judging style meaning the room stays open while the judges work. Jim Frye did a fantastic job putting the judges together. Here Kevin Collins (dark blue center) makes a point to another judge working on cars. Down the way, Jim Wechsler (light blue) tends to the armor judging. The basic construction rules are followed for fit finish and creativity, but a departure from the IPMS 1-2-3. There may be several bronze or silver awards in a category, and then one gold for

overall in that category. The way the contest works is two rows of double wide tables going down the middle of the room and the vendors all around the edges. Actually works out quite well. A break somewhere in the middle would have been welcomed and am surprised the Fire Marshall did not enforce.

Hobby Day March 8th 2019 By Mark Deliduka

As everyone knows here locally, Hobby Day weekend is every second Saturday of every month and the Friday before, and it is hosted by the St. Crispin's Irregulars headed up by Harmon Ward. Recently the St. Crispin's Irregulars has been hosting a group of mentally challenged people from an organization called 'My Day Counts'. They are a group of highly functional people who are brought out for a couple hours of activities to help them develop their interpersonal skills, social interaction, sharpen their mental abilities as well as their ability to participate in physical activities like playing games and building models while relating with others. A number of them thoroughly enjoyed building the models 1 had already had at the hall, and more of them have become interested in building as well. Two months ago, 1 approached the IPMS Orange County club and requested assistance in acquiring more models for these people to build. The response was most generous; a total



of \$162.00 was donated by the members for this event. Unfortunately, due to a number of issues 1 was facing, 1 was not able to buy anything for the following Hobby Day. However a couple days before the next Hobby Day on March 8th, 1 went and purchased several kits which included some snap together models as well as 'Easy Build' models along with some glue. 1 had forgotten to get some acrylic paints for them but they didn't need them at this time.

I set out the models for them before they arrived so they had a selection to choose from. I talked with the chaperones that were coaching them, helping them to know how the glue was to be used and also explained the fine points of decals, instruction sequences, and numbering on the sprues.

At least eleven individuals were involved in building or assisting in building four of the models that the club had generously purchased for them. One pirate ship, two aircraft and a truck were started by the group, along with another aircraft that they had started in previous months. Every one of them was thrilled and excited and they were constantly thanking me and giving me a thumbs up. One gentleman managed to bring his plane to the paint stage, although I did have to help with the canopy and

windscreen. He and his helpers were thrilled with the result. I was even able to help educate one of the chaperones on the operation of the flaps on the wings and how they are used to slow and turn an aircraft in flight.

There are still a number of kits as backups that 1 am currently holding onto until we find room to keep them at the Hall. It seems we have plenty of models now to last for quite a few months at this time. 1 will also be working on getting a couple acrylic paint sets so everyone who can and wants to paint can paint their models.





Overall it was a very successful and productive Hobby Day for everyone. The chaperones and leaders of the group who came told me how excited and thrilled everyone was and that it had been the best day for them to date. It looks like we have a good thing going for some many months to come.



Water, Ore, Sweat and Fortune Scratch built homestead cabin By Terry Huber



On this scratch built subject if you have been following I am about to assemble the pieces I cut for the cabin sides. I had found out when I began to assemble that I cut two left side pieces to the cabin annex, one of them was backwards meaning I should have flipped my pattern over for the other side.




The culprit pieces here

Anyway I cut a new annex piece and shaped it up with the other side, cut out the openings for the windows and installed them on the proper walls. Next is to assemble all of the walls together. I used Tamiya cement orange bottle, and Zap medium in some spots.

I do not want to show off anything inside the cabin so I spray paint the inside black. Eventually I will add window "glass" to the inside with parchment Tichy Train Group shades which should block everything.



So after this I am thinking it is time to paint the cabin basecoat prior to any weathering. I mask off the black I just painted and then sprayed with Tamiya AS-15 USAF Tan.




After spraying I clean up all the window wrung where paint might have built up. Now have to think about the roof. I need an asphalt shingle style in HO. I checked Arnie's Trains in Westminster but he did not have it. I checked

at Plastruct on line and ordered it there along with one of their catalogs. At \$5 for the catalog, it is amazing browsing through it and noticing all of those bits

and pieces architects use to build their models of building projects, or a natural gas factory. Cool stuff.





So I have been using what Plastruct calls HO Scale / 1:100, these look great in scale, as soon as I figured out which side was up and the side (People laughing) I to paint. measured and cut the sections for the roof, and also built the front porch roof and posts. I used coffee stir stick wood to fashion

the posts for the front porch. Everything got sprayed with a





basecoat of Tamiya TS-62 Nato Brown. I assembled the roof and porch to the cabin and this is where I stop. TH



Next up: Weathering and dry brushing, and protective coats inbetween.

What makes our tours unique 2?

So, I mentioned in the last installment of what makes our trips unique six factors: 1. Unique, never to be repeated itineraries, 2. Tours designed for modelers, 3. Stops at hobby shops and manufacturers, 4. The opportunity to build a model while traveling on the bus, 5. Small groups, and finally a first -class coach with all the amenities to take us to every destination in full comfort. But here is another factor Flexibility. We can vote on options of things to do. So, for example, if you look at the 2017 trip itinerary, in addition to what was on the itinerary, we saw the following: Winston Churchill's War Rooms, The Imperial War Museum, The British Army Museum, The Albert and Victoria Museum, the British Museum in London. On the Isle of Wight, we took a ride on a steam train before heading to Portsmouth, where we also saw, though not on a tour, the HMS Victory.

For Fran, a wife of one of our guests, we arranged a personal one-on-one tour of Downton Abbey. In France, we saw several sites in the Normandy area that were distant parts of the overall landings, such as Longues sur Mer and the emplacements there. I convinced the guide at Saumur to let us climb aboard and into the Tiger I. And in Germany, we went to the German-Polish border to visit a small museum on the Seelow Heights, which is where the Soviet forces launched their final offensive towards Berlin.

Prior to the trip through to the present I have been repeatedly asked three questions: 1. Why do you organize such trips? 2. Why are the trips for three weeks? 3. Why a military theme?

The first is the most important to me. As a child, my parents sent me to Europe almost every summer. They did so because they wanted me to get to know the family on both my mother's and my father's side, they wanted me to retain and practice my language skills, and finally, they thought it was the best form of education. I would travel to Europe alone or sometimes with my older sister, and every time I went, I had a blast. Upon my return, I would share stories of the things I had seen and done, but I could never really impart in words the excitement and thrill of what I did. So I guess I have always wanted to take people to Europe to share the experience. But the real catalyst was hearing of friends and acquaintances being diagnosed with illnesses or debilitating injuries, or those diagnosed with terminal cancer or the like. At that point, I determined not to go to my maker with a long list of "would haves", "should haves" or "could haves" and that I would do and see as much in my lifetime as I possibly could.

Second, I know most people only get two weeks of vacation. When I originally conceived the trip in 2017 it started as a two-week trip. 
