Model structures from scratch built materials

Well if you followed along from the previous months I visited many turn of the 1900 century or much earlier locations on the eastern side of the Sierra Nevada mountain range here in CA, following the Carson & Colorado Railway. My travels along with road warrior Pascal Zandt centered specifically on US 395 as it travels along Owens Lake up through towards and the Mammoth Mountain area. I do plan on future trips up towards the terminal of the Carson & Colorado Railway near Mound House NV at the top left corner on the map.

For now I want to look at modeling some structures that I saw during the trip and show some materials for siding and roofing, since most available aftermarket items are in HO scale (1/87) I will use that here. If you build O Gauge (1/48) railroad they

have larger scale siding and roofing for that and I also saw some N Gauge items available as well at Arnie's Trains over here in Westminster CA, excellent resource.





Model structures from scratch built materials



I have never scratch built any structures before but if you have adequate modeling skills in cutting plastic, gluing and then air brush painting and weathering you should be OK. First you want to decide what building or piece you want to construct from the era you are modeling. In this case for the eastern Sierra's we are talking about anywhere from 1849 through 1960 and possibly

later. Most of these structures range from mud brick to board and batten or clapboard siding like that on train depots along with corrugated tin roofs or wood shingles. Here is an example of the restored Station Agents house in Laws CA. It is built by vertical boards being placed along the framing, and then a batten piece is nailed over the seam line where the boards meet to clean up that seam and keep the weather out at the same time.

Or if you want to model something in clapboard siding here is an example from the Hole in the Wall Mercantile in Randsburg CA. Some siding is just edge to edge, others overlap the lower board from the top down.

I consulted Foster Rash club scratch builder extraordinaire for some advice on where to start. For instance my initial question is how do you convert actual feet to 1/87 HO scale feet. Well the exact conversion is 3.5mm equals one scale HO foot. Next he mentioned the easiest way is to purchase the Model Railroader Scale Rule. Off to Arnie's I went. Found the MASCOT brand scale ruler. It is divided up between HO gage scales, S gage scale, O gage scale on one side and on the back N gage, a 1/64ths scale, a decimal equivalents for number drills, a 100 mm scale, and tap and drill sizes for small screws. Very handy item I think it was \$16 at Arnie's.





I decided as a simple starting point I would build my friend Bill's cabin at the base of White Mountain in CA. It's not too big and should come together fairly easy. It is a board and batten cabin and a shingle roof so all of those materials are available in The windows are scale items. Tichy available from Train Group, excellent source for scale doors, windows, accessories like the vent pipes, attic vents and

also they make railroad decals, too many items to mention here in all the regular railroad scales, everything for the scratch builder. <u>https://www.tichytraingroup.com/</u>

So now I can calculate the size of the cabin by estimating how large it is from the photos. But where to start? Foster mentions using cereal box cardboard to build a mockup of the Structure before you cut expensive plastic. Measure on the cardboard and mark your wall sections and cut out the window and door openings and then tape the sections together. I found some thin cardboard from those electronic devices packaging that I used for my cabin. After I had a few sections cut I started taping them together. When I got to the roof I decided to use white glue to try and hold everything together. I finally was able to put something together in about 2 hours. I figured I would layout the same dimensions on Evergreen sheet board and batten, and I also have Plastruct shingle roof tiles. More next month. *TH*








Any Day Now!



News from the deep frozen North



Many of the old wagon trails used by the pioneers have been paved and today we are able to explore historic sites of the Wild West from the comfort of an air conditioned vehicle. Even the old unpaved trails can be explored for sport on dirt bikes or 4x4s. Venturing out into the desert should never be taken lightly, but in the 1800s it was a deadly serious business. Even with the danger, there were prospectors and ranchers

who explored and lived in remote, inhospitable areas. Small communities developed, many of which are now long forgotten ghost towns, and desert freighters provided the supply link. "Big Mike" Goldwater, the grandfather of Arizona Senator and presidential candidate Barry Goldwater, was a teamster. He hauled freight from Los Angeles to the mining camps of the Arizona Territory.


Hauling freight to Deadwood, ND in the 1870s

Remi Nadeau was the most famous of the California freighters. He hauled freight from Los Angeles to many remote camps and established routes that are still in use today.

Remi Nadeau

Nadeau was a French Canadian who arrived in Los Angeles in 1861 with a wagon and a team of oxen. He became a freighter on the 35 day (one way) journey to Salt Lake City. When traffic on this route declined due to competition from the railroad, Nadeau won a contract to haul silver bullion from the Cerro Gordo mines in the Inyo Mountains on the eastern shore of Owens Lake. He built the largest freighting company in California and conceived of the 16-20 mule team wagons, made famous later by Pacific Coast Borax, to carry the heavy load of silver ingots.



Nadeau's company prospered and eventually hauled to and from mines as far north as Death Valley. By 1873 he operated 80 such teams and brought 200 tons of silver into Los Angeles each month. He hauled food, lumber, machinery and whiskey back to the miners. The Cerro Gordo trade was a significant part of the Los Angeles economy in the 1870s.



Nadeau's А photo of freighters hauling hay through Soledad Canyon (near Santa Clarita) in the 1870s. This would be Hwy 14, the Antelope Valley Fwy, and today. Nadeau's men cached food and supplies on the outbound journey to sustain them on the return trip through the desert.

At the time it was built, the four story Nadeau Hotel was both the tallest building in LA and was the first building in LA with an elevator.

Nadeau became one of the wealthiest men in Los Angeles and his company accounted for 25% of all freight shipped out of Los Angeles in the 1870s. In 1883, Nadeau began hauling



borax from Death Valley to the railhead at Mojave. He invested in real estate in downtown Los Angeles in the area around present day City Hall. In Nadeau's time this was an area of barns, corrals, stables, blacksmiths and repair shops. He purchased the property at the southwest corner of Spring and First streets where he developed a commercial center.

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Tiburcio Vasquez

The bandit Tiburcio Vasquez was the nemesis of the desert freighters. Vasquez was born into a prominent *Californio* family (*Californios* were the original Spanish colonists of California); His grandfather had been the *Alcalde* (mayor) of San Jose. Tiburcio was an educated, well dressed, charismatic figure who sang, danced, and played guitar. But he resented the Yankees who had taken California and the Californios loss of power. He fancied himself a Robin Hood-like character and felt justified in preying upon Yankee commerce.


Tiburcio Vasquez was the inspiration for the fictional character *Zorro*.

Vasquez was popular with the Spanish speaking population because for many years he outwitted the Anglo authorities who tried to catch him. He was the inspiration for writer Johnston McCulley's creation of *Zorro* in 1919. Of course one couldn't have a Hispanic bandit outwitting the Anglo authorities, so McCulley backdated the setting to Spanish Colonial times.

Vasquez had a camp in the badlands north of Los Angeles from which he raided wagon trains and robbed travelers. One of the Cerro Gordo mine owners had a plan to foil Vasquez' robbing of silver shipments. The silver was specially cast in huge 500 pound ingots! Vasquez intercepted the shipment and with great difficulty he and his men were able to remove a silver ingot from one of Nadeau's wagons. But the wouldbe-robbers were unable to transport it; They gave up, left the

ingot on the ground and rode away, The silver was loaded back into the wagon and the journey resumed.



Look familiar? This dramatic rock formation in Vasquez Rocks County Park is a popular movie and TV location. Bonanza, Gunsmoke, Maverick, Twilight Zone, Star Wars and Star Trek are among countless productions that have used Vasquez Rocks as a filming location.

Later in their journey, while winding their way down the mountain trail of what is now

Hwy 14 in Vasquez Rocks County Park near Santa Clarita, Nadeau's wagons were stopped again by Vasquez and his men. This time Vasquez had brought a heavy wagon of his own, rolled one of the ingots into it and rumbled away!

Vasquez' undoing was his passion for the ladies. He had seduced and impregnated a young woman and her vengeful family tipped off the authorities that Vasquez was visiting friends at Rancho La Brea (near the La Brea Tar Pits in the present day Wilshire District of Los Angeles). Vasquez was captured and tried for murder and other crimes committed over the course of his 20 year criminal career. He was sentenced to hang and while he was in jail awaiting execution, Remi Nadeau visited him. Nadeau asked, "I saved your life once mi amigo and we had an agreement that you would never rob my freighters. Why did you do this?" Vasquez replied, "Because you are mi amigo, that is why I took only one ingot, not all, from you!" Legend has it that the 500 pound ingot is buried somewhere in Vasquez Rocks County Park.

Building Some Models

1 enjoy reading about our local history and exploring historical sites. This interest is reflected in my modeling. 1 model the period 1865-1939 on my 1:48 scale model railroad. It's easy to create a particular era with vehicles. 1 can remove all the motor vehicles to create the late 19th century. By adding a few vintage autos, it becomes the 20th century.

Horse drawn vehicles were widely used in America up to WWII but finding them in 1:48 scale can be a challenge. In the 1950s, Revell produced the *Miniature Masterpieces* series of approximately 1:48 scale wagon models, many of which were Wild West themed. These are excellent little kits built right out of the box or can be used for kit-bashing and as parts sources for scratch building projects.


Lew Glaser (on right) founded Revell

The *Miniature Masterpieces* models were the brainchild of Revell's founder, Lew Glaser. 1 won't go much into the history of Revell here as that can be easily found on the internet. But Glaser started a small injection molding operation called Precision Specialties in 1941 and manufactured various components for the military during WWII. After the war, he switched to making injection molded plastic toys.



to manufacture a series of 1:32 scale model cars called *Highway Pioneers*. These were very successful and around 1953 the kits began to be marketed under the Revell brand name.

The success of *Highway Pioneers* led directly to Glaser's next product line, *Miniature Masterpieces*. The *Miniature Masterpieces* series of horse drawn wagons and carriages was the result of a partnership between Glaser and Steve

Adams. Glaser's agreement with Adams was that Glaser would choose the subjects and sculpt the masters. Adams would make and retain ownership of the molds. Owing to the popularity of "westerns" on TV and the movies at the time, Glaser wisely selected mostly "wild west" themed subjects.



Whether Miniature Masterpieces, Revell, Adams, Athearn, UPC or Life-Like, the kit contents are all the same.

Initially these kits were marketed under the Miniature Masterpieces brand name; later the

boxes were labeled Miniature Masterpieces by Revell. Adams also released the kits under his own label and eventually sold the molds. The kits have since been re-released many times under the Athearn, UPC and Life-Like labels. This is good for builders because there are a fair number of these kits out there and only the Revell and Adams labels currently bring high collector prices. One box states a constant scale of 1:40, but I would disagree.

Calculating from the size of the wheels and figures, 1 would say these kits are around 1:50 scale. The Borax wagons are described as 1:67 scale. However, all of these kits are close enough to 1:48 scale to look OK with O scale trains.










This kit recycles a number of figures and parts from previous kits: The boy, his dad and the oxen from the covered wagon, the vaquero with the

The United States Borax Corporation (formerly Pacific Coast Borax) sponsored the long running (1952-70) TV series *Death Valley Days*. They approached Revell to design a promo kit and the result was closely related to the Miniatures Masterpiece series.



"Hey kids! Send the Old Ranger a dollar and a Boraxo box top to get your own 20 Mule Team Borax model!" The kit makes a very impressive 44 inch long model when assembled.

Revell designed the product, sculpted the masters and Adams made the molds. The 20 mule team kit was never released under any of the Revell, Adams, Athearn, UPC or Life Like brands; it was only offered as a promotional item from U.S. Borax.





Kit Review: Life-Like (Revell) Pioneer Wagon

I was inspired by the stories of the desert freighters to build a couple of wagons from old *Miniature Masterpieces* kits in my stash

Bruce Openshaw and I sometimes have a chuckle at the IPMS meetings when the conversation turns to the subject of "bad kits." I think it is a disservice to casual builders or the people just entering or returning to the hobby to suggest that older kits are unworthy. Anyone remember Keith Mundt's Lysander built from

an old Hawk kit? Keith made it a contest winner! *(The Best Aircraft at the National Convention this year. Ed)* Contests aside, just for an out of the box fun build an old kit can provide several evenings of entertainment. As Bruce says, "Some kits are better than others, but there are no bad kits." With a bit of care in assembly and with the finishing materials/techniques available today, an older kit can become a "miniature masterpiece."

Construction of the Pioneer Wagon is straight forward

The original Revell release of this 45 piece kit sold for 98 cents. I think I paid about \$10 for the Life-Like reissue at a Keller show. Fortunately all of the parts were there and in good condition.

Due to the thickness of the plastic in some older kits, 1 find old fashioned tube glue works better than liquid glue. The tube glue does not evaporate as quickly, gives you more time to align parts, and

penetrates the plastic better for a good bond. I clamp major parts together while the glue sets.



The tilt (wagon cover) was not designed to extend the full length of the wagon. 1 stretched it by cutting it in half and realigning it with strips of

styrene. It's hard for me to just build anything out-of-the-box, I guess it's a mental thing.


After the glue on the alignment strips had set overnight, 1 formed a piece of styrene to fill the gap and glued/clamped it in place. After that dried overnight, 1 blended the edges with Tamiya putty and simulated wrinkled fabric by sculpting with a Dremel tool.

Then Advanced Modelers Syndrome kicked in and I had to take the project a step further. I decided to create a desert freighter rig similar to that in the photo earlier in this article of the Deadwood wagon train.




After a couple of hours in the freezer compartment of my refrigerator, the glue joints easily popped apart. There was a little bit of old glue that had to be scraped away.

I had the partial remains of a 20 Mule Team Borax kit which could be used to build a freight wagon.


I cut down the body of the borax wagon by removing the top two "boards" on the sides. I cut a new floor from styrene to the same width as the Pioneer Covered Wagon.





Ready for primer. 1 opted to use the mules from the borax wagon instead of the oxen from the pioneer wagon and modified a spare tilt from another covered wagon kit to fit the kitbashed freight wagon.

Rather than paint all of the parts before assembly, I painted them as sub-assemblies (wheels, wagon bodies, figures). I used Rustoleum Khaki from their Camouflage Series of spray paint as a base coat. After the base coat had completely dried, I brushed on a wash of medium brown (diluted Michael's Craftsmart brand acrylic craft paint). I painted the mules Rustoleum Camouflage Series Earth Brown and the wagon tilts with flat white primer. The tilts received a wash of light brown and the mules a wash of black.

These old Revell kits have finely molded details that I usually obliterated by brushing on a heavy coat of Testors enamel back when I was a kid. After adding the pre-painted final details, I did a little more painting with a fine brush to accentuate the molded-in details. Then I dry brushed highlights using acrylics to make the details "pop." Strips of paper were used for reins. The figures received a base coat of white primer and were painted with acrylics.


The finished model was sprayed with Testors Dulcote to protect the weathering. 1 laminated pieces of thin corrugated cardboard cut from a USPS shipping box to form a display base. I used hot glue instead of a water base glue to avoid warping the cardboard. The cardboard was sealed with a base coat of white pigmented shellac and painted with earth tone acrylic (Craftsmart) when the paint dried, I brushed on some diluted white glue and sifted dirt into it to simulate desert terrain.

Including painting, the Deadwood wagons took a week of evenings to complete. It was an inexpensive build and I'm satisfied with the results... not too bad for kits produced over 60 years ago!



The cart frame and tongue where whittled from a twig. Floorboards cut from a coffee stir stick. Railings are toothpicks. Driver is a modified model railroad figure with a sombrero added.

One more thing ...

So I had the oxen left over from the Pioneer Wagon and a couple of wheels left over from the borax wagons. An idea came to me to build a heavy Mexican oxcart like Tiburcio Vasquez might have used to steal the 500 pound silver ingot from Remi Nadeau.

Hopefully the new owners of Cerro Gordo will not stage hokey stage coach robberies and "shootouts" for tourists. *FR*




