This is like That...

Parables are a marvelous way of envisioning and conceptualizing things, and many of our experiences are just that – *living* parables. Think of it any way you like, but the bottom line is you are probably better equipped to face challenges than you think, especially if you actively engage in looking for those life analogies – even when engaging in your hobby. I am gladly telling you that, yes, I have had a few confounding things in my personal life that have been solved by the creative application of something I learned in the hobby (patience, craftsmanship, and trying again, to name a few) and likewise, a few a few have gone the other way where something in my personal life has given me a good modeling tip (listen to the criticism of those you love and live with, go with the flow, etc.). Look, we readily apply stuff we learn when building armor to cars, or cars to planes, or planes to, well, more planes, so just think in a bigger scale (forgive the pun). Life is filled with plenty of how-to lessons; sometimes you just have to step back and look a little to find them.

The end point to *all* of this is life *really is* a scratchbuilding project, so build on and build boldly. Work through the issues, both modeling and otherwise. Keep on keeping on (I learned that one from watching my dad and apply it liberally to hobbies, work, and family – see what I mean?).



November: Autos—self explanatory


December: Helicopters—self explanatory

Whats on your bench?

Yak on Skis By Lyn Gorton

OK This month Laura has not done any work to her pontoon bridge because she has been working on her group build model, so you get a double helping of Yak.

Last month we finished the model build and noted the orange peel on the wings, we now start on the diorama base. As this is a small and pretty basic snow scene I have just stapled some chicken wire to represent piled snow to an A4 size board, I have then covered this with plaster cloth which you can pick up at Hobby Lobby, its easy to use and gives a solid foundation to build on.







As you can see from the picture below the foundation is formed but needs some shaping using Mod Roc or model foam to smooth out the lumps and bumps



Once the model foam has been applied I created the ski marks with further applications. Next step is to apply the Tamiya Snow effect paint

Setting the diorama build aside for a moment, it is now time to select a figure. Figures are an important feature of most diorama's as the act as a focus and provide a scale depth of field for the overall project. I prefer to use Resin figures when I can as these have much sharper details on them, the only drawback is resin does not stick very well, so I usually drill and peg arms legs etc to add extra strength when positioning.





It is also ,time to address the orange peel situation on the wing. I just sparingly applied some dabs of the Tamiya snow to cover the affected parts and was quite pleased with the effect. You can still see the small portholes which were the only fuel gauges on this aircraft.



Final positioning before gluing all parts to the base. I added some oil/fuel drums to give some relief as this depicts a forward winter base it would be quite common to refuel from drums

Ok so the project is now finished, we now need some more of you to step up and show us what is on your work bench.

As always I welcome positive criticisms and would love to here from you if you have other ideas about how you would have tackled this project.

As a foot note I was very impressed with both the Accurate Miniatures kit and the Tamiya snow.I would not hesitate to build another accurate Miniatures kit and will be looking at some of their other models and seeing what comes to mind for another diorama.

I will have this diorama on display at the July meeting when the contest theme is dioramas.

Brengun 1/144 German Staff Car ByJim Pearsall IPMS

The vehicle:

Every armed force in World War II used civilian automobiles as transportation for "important" people. There were American Dodges, Buicks, and Fords, T\the British used Bentleys and Austins, the Germans used Opels and Horches. Brengun doesn't specify which model of automobile this kit represents, but it's obviously a "luxury" car, with a hard top and 4 doors. It's definitely nicer than Hans-Joachim Marseille's Kubelwagen.

The Kit:

You get two resin staff cars in the kit. There is a PE fret an instruction sheet, and a small decal sheet with license plates for two cars.



Assembly:

There really isn't any assembly to this kit. I removed the pour block from the connectors at the bottom of the car, and then cut these connectors off of the bottom of the car.

Brengun did a marvelous design job on the mold for this car. The pour block is easily removed from the connecting parts with a saw. I then used a PE razor saw to remove most of the connectors from the bottom of the car. I used a #11 blade to remove the last of the pour connectors. This was one of the easiest resin prep jobs I've ever done.

Painting:

I decided I wanted to do the "civilian" version. This requires removal of the blackout light on the left front fender. The same razor saw that removed the pour channels from the bottom of the car worked very well here. A couple of swipes with a fine sanding stick, and it was ready to paint.





I used Testors Gloss Black from the small bottle. The one I used sold originally for 39 cents. Yep, I've got some old paint, but it's still good.

Once the paint was dry, I used dark gray to paint the windows. I needed a contrasting color to the black, and this worked.





When the windows were done, I sprayed Future on them to protect the windows and to make them glossy. The next step was to add the chrome. A while back my IPMS chapter sponsored a "modeler's workshop" on a Saturday. One of the car modelers was showing off how nicely the chrome went on his car using a silver marker. I had a silver marker on my workbench, and by golly it does work marvelously. My thanks to him for that advice. I also used a black Sharpie to cover some sloppy paint work on a couple of the windows.

Decals

The decals are a front and rear license plate. I got the decals out, and checked where they were to be applied. There was no place on the back of the car to put the license! Then I looked more carefully at the instructions and discovered that there's a metal license plate on the PE fret. Well, OK to that. I painted the back of the plate black, applied the decal to the other side, cut the PE part loose, and glued the license to the left rear of the car.

The decals were very good. Considering the tiny size of the front license, it still came off the backing paper cleanly, didn't roll, fold or tear, and allowed me to align it on the bumper.

And I had finished my 1/144th Staff Car.

Overall Evaluation

This kit is a little beauty. I really like the way it looks and it would be a wonderful addition to a diorama or just as an addon to a German tank or aircraft kit. I posed my staff car with Wolfgang Falck's Me-110. Falck was the commander of NJG1, and probably had a number of distinguished visitors who had staff cars like this one.

The molding is exceptional, the resin is workable, and it was a project which didn't take a lot of time.

There are two pennants on the PE fret. Some German staff cars in the Google Images search have pennants on the front fender. Brengun doesn't show this on the instructions, but it would be an interesting addition to the car.

You <u>DO NOT</u> have to be an IPMS USA member to volunteer. We will have some perks for those members who volunteer their time. If you volunteer for two 2hr shifts (4 hr's) you will receive a free 2018 Convention Volunteer T-Shirt.

Registration: We would like to have volunteers to help out with registration and give out the registration packages, T -shirts, etc. as required. These people don't have to be Arizona IPMS Chapter members. We will need 3-4 volunteers to actually register members these positions are only open to Arizona IPMS Chapter members. A little computer knowledge will be helpful here Their will be 2 or 3 training classes so everyone can become proficient with the process and we can test the systems.

Model Entry: We would like to have volunteers to assist entrants fill out the contest entry forms. With all the different categories and some new rule changes this can be quite confusing. We will have a short class to insure everyone is up to speed on the rules and categories. There are some positions that require some prior training and these will be handled by Arizona IPMS Chapter members.

Contest/Vendor Room Security: We would like to have volunteers to act as security for the contest and vendor rooms. This position requires checking tickets and wrist bands to allow guests access to these rooms. They will also patrol the contest room to remind visitors not to touch the models. After the contest they will need to check the models leaving the contest room to insure that none go missing.

Make -N-Take: We would like to have volunteers to help with Make-N-Take. These people will need to be able to mentor children and teens in building model kits. Volunteers will need to have patience and be good with children. Subject to screening by Make -N- Take coordinator.




EDITORS CORNER
