Last month was a Build and BS meeting so all the minutes of the meeting were spent building and bs-ing.

The Bob Sistek Collection Auction

Last month Bob's widow Johanna contacted me about his collection of unbuilt model kits. We agreed on a plan for me to pick up the kits, inventory and check them out, and then pull a couple out for the club raffle and auction the rest with the proceeds to go to the Hospice of the Western Reserve. Any kits not sold in the auction will be donated to the veteran's home for those there to build. Our goal is for his collection to benefit as many folks as we can.

I recently finished going through the more than 150 kits and accessory sets as well as some 50 books, cataloging and checking them for completeness. About a quarter of the kits are started or are missing parts (no surprise – he was a builder after all) which I'll likely leave out of the auction while another quarter have aftermarket goodies inside (also no surprise).

Classic Auto Shows – Tis the Season

With the warm weather upon us the classic car show season revs up (see what I did there?). I've listed a couple big ones for the east side under the Upcoming Events. If antique motoring vehicles is something you enjoy get yourself out to a couple of these events, and if you know of a good one let me know and I'll post it in the newsletter.

What the Heck is That?

Last month the *What the Heck?* was the 1966 Lincoln Continental convertible, one of only three built by Allegheny Ludlum out of stainless steel.

Back in the early 1930s the folks at the Allegheny Steel in Pittsburgh were looking for ways to showcase their new stainless steel product. Though varieties of the corrosion resistant “unstainable steel” had been around for 100 years it wasn’t until the 1910s that a good, durable and malleable version was ready for the manufacturing world. Allegheny Steel talked to Ford and agreed to produce six 1936 Deluxe Sedans. The partnership, now with Allegheny Ludlum, was renewed in the late 1950s to build two 1960 Thunderbirds and once more to build the 1966 Lincoln Continental. The Lincoln was to commemorate the 50,000th Continental produced, with an additional two for promotional purposes for Allegheny Ludlum. Some sources state that all three were titled as 1967 models though two were using the 1966 trim and only one was in the 1967 trim, other say two were in 1967 trim.

All of these cars were fully functioning models used for promotions; the 1936 Fords had over 200,000 miles each before being retired and sold to the public in 1946. The Thunderbirds each rolled more than 100,000 miles before they too were retired from the promo circuit. Four of the six 1936 Deluxe Sedans still exist, along with both Thunderbirds and all three Continentals. Allegheny Ludlum has one each of the 1936 Deluxe and the Thunderbird along with their two Continentals. The only public place to see a full set is our own Crawford Museum. In fact, R4 attendees passed by this stainless beauty on the way to the vendors. So, you’ll notice last month’s WTH was tied into our Regional Convention. Damn, I feel clever.




