

### 2 Bill's Banter

Persistent or patient, what's the difference?

To keep slogging on it even when I wanted to build something else. The kit had an identity to me. It was always persistent in letting me know it was there and had to be finished (I hated that). I felt it staring at me when I worked on something else to avoid burnout. I stayed patient and was rewarded with a model that came out how I wanted it to look.

Now that this epic build of mine has been completed, what did I learn from it? I learned small bits are better than large chunks. I learned to stop and really look at what I had already accomplished and then see what still had to be done. This doesn't seem like a big thing, but for me it was a game changer. When I finally stopped and took stock of what was done and how it was done, made me want to get finished. It was the kick that got me back to being persistent instead of being patient.
